Routine Business At Council Opening

Much of the business dealt with by York County Council during the initial 1963 sessions last week was of a routine nature.

The Warden requested Mrs. C. Ion to explain to the other members the purpose of the Association of Ontario Counties as she is a Vice President.

Mrs. Ion said that about seven years ago a few Counties associated themselves to assist in furthering the interest of each. As the number grew an Association was formed and at a convention last year 32 of the 38 Counties in Ontario were represented.

Wm. Sellars the past Warden stated that he was surprised to see the Warden had set up a commission to deal with Police, Welfare and Assessment as he considered these matters were all settled in 1962. Warden Davis said that was true, but the subjects kept coming back and he thought the continuity of a committee was valuable.

In the report of the Warden and Commissioners for the past

year, there was no discussion or question until it was disclosed the County took a loss of over \$70,000 on the debentures sold for the hospital. No credit was offered for the \$9,715 made on Treasury Bills.

County Council are going to keep pressing on the door of the Attorney General until he gives the green light for the County to have its own administration of Justice.

In the report of the York Manor Commission it is evident that many persons in the new home are paying. The rate for 1962 was \$5.08 per day but will be raised to \$5.94 for 1963. The Supt. stated that a greater number of bed patients were now in the home and it was required that a trained nurse be on duty or on call at all times. He stated that including himself the number was three.

The Supt. stated that it was desirous of having some form of auxiliary power as in a case of power failure it was impossible for many of the patients to be cared for.

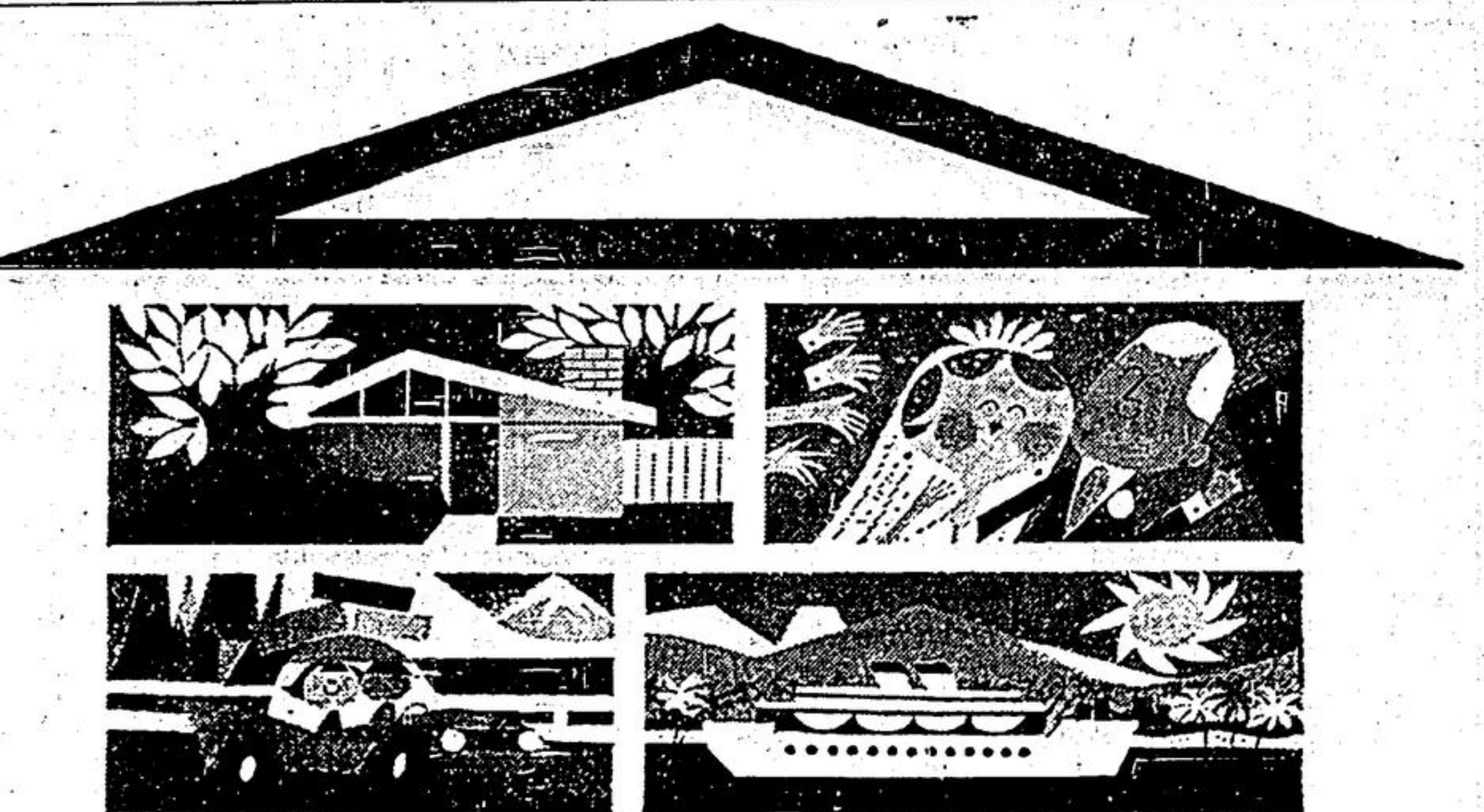
