16-Yr.-Old Unionville Skating Star Has Sights on World Title

Sixteen year old Debbi Wilkes of Unionville is just "one of the crowd, among the student ranks at the Markham Dist. High School but, when she dons her magic pair of sparkling figure skates she becomes a star in another world.

Debbi, neat as a pin and cute as a button, is no different than her boy-girl companions who daily strive to solve the sometimes puzzling problems of grade 11 Geometry, Latin and French—with one exception, her figure skating interests receive top priority over basketball games, movies and weekend dates.

"She's going steady with skating," agreed Mrs. Ruth Wilkes, her mother, when talking to The Tribune recently. "I just haven't any more time," said Debbi.

Skating Since 6 Debbi first graced the ice lanes at the age of six. Two years later, as a member of the Unionville Figure Skating Club, she commenced a more ambitious training program that has lifted her up among the best in the business. Her partner is 21 year old Guy Revell of Newmarket. On Tuesday, Feb. 5th, the pair will leave for Edmonton to take part in the Canadian Championships. They will then go to Vancouver for the North American competitions and on to Cortina, Italy in quest of the World Title.

Debbi's skates, a custom-made pair, cost \$90. Extreme care must be taken in sharpen-

ing the blades. This is done once and sometimes twice a month, depending on ice conditions.

Very Co-operative Debbi is the first to admit that her figure skating activities make it difficult for her to keep pace with the academic progress of her class. A former member of the high school staff, Mrs. Rod Torrance has provided her with additional hours of instruction to replace the time that is missed. "The principal and teachers have all been wonderful," she said. To date, Debbi's standing has been so good that she has not had to write any June examinations.

Debbi hinted that if good fortune continues to smile on her and partner, Guy, they might consider turning professional like their predecessors, Maria and Otto Jelinek.

Mrs. Wilkes almost always accompanies her daughter on her trips abroad and this arrangement has proven very satisfactory. "It gives me a shoulder to lean on," said Debbi. They are a closely knit two some with a third party, a big boxer dog, named "Toni". A sister, Susan, is a Lab. Technician at the Women's College Hospital, Toronto and a brother, Robert, lives in Belleville.

A well-filled scrap book tells an exciting picture story of Debbi's life on skates—a story of much work, many sacrifices and many, many thrills.



If 16 year old Debbi Wilkes of Unionville finds it difficult to keep her thoughts concentrated on her grade 11 studies, it's understandable. The next four weeks will be packed with more thrills and ex-

citement than most persons would experience in a lifetime. With her partner, Guy Revell of Newmarket, she will compete in the Canadian Figure Skating Championships at Edmonton from Feb. 7 to 9. She will then move on to Vancouver for the North American competition, Feb. 15 and 16 and finally conclude in a bid for the World Title in Cortina, Italy, Feb. 27 to March 3.
