of Whipper Billy Watson, well known wrestler, has been suggested by some party members from the northern end of the riding where Mr. Watson's many community activities are well known.

The association by its nature, must now remain neutral," Mr. Findlay said, "but I can promise that the Conservatives of York North will field a strong candidate to bring the riding back to the government side of the House of Commons."

As MP for York North, Mr. Cathers was chairman of the banking and commerce committee of the House of Commons. He was instrumental in helping to set up the royal commission investigating government organization and it was on his recommendation that Prime Minister Diefenbaker appointed another York County resident, J. Grant Glasco, Vaughan township, as chairman of the investigation which is now making its reports. Mr. Cathers also with his committee brought changes in resale price maintenance laws to give the small retailer a better chance to compete, and spent months of study before the new estate tax law replaced succession duties.

Mr. Cathers grew up in East York, son of a Toronto policeman. One of a large family, he left school to work, later returning to attend university. He went to work in the investment business and established his own firm. In 1936 he moved to King township where he farms. He was campaign chairman for the Hurricane Hazel fund, and for York county hospital. He was one of the organizers of King township federation of Agriculture, and a director of Aurora Agricultural Society. He is a member of Newmarket Lions Club and Aurora Board of Trade.

Mr. and Mrs. Cathers have four children, a son and daughter in school, a daughter with an airline and a married son in London, Ontario.

BLAME WAGE BOOST FOR BUS LINE DEFICIT

Two boosts in wages in 1962 with another pending in 1963 are blamed for the current losses of the Yonge St. bus line which serves a portion of Markham Township. Reeve Dean told members of council on Monday night that he had met recently with the mayor of Richmond Hill and the reeve of Vaughan on the matter. He said the loss in three years was \$11,000, and the additional loss estimated for 1963 was \$3,000.

Reeve Dean said that an increase in fares was quite likely. "You talk about having a commuter train service when we can't even make the one pay we've got," commented councillor Rumble.

Council passed a resolution calling on the government to waive the seat tax charge on the bus line which is charged 25% to Markham Twp. and 25% to Vaughan and runs into several thousand dollars for the year.

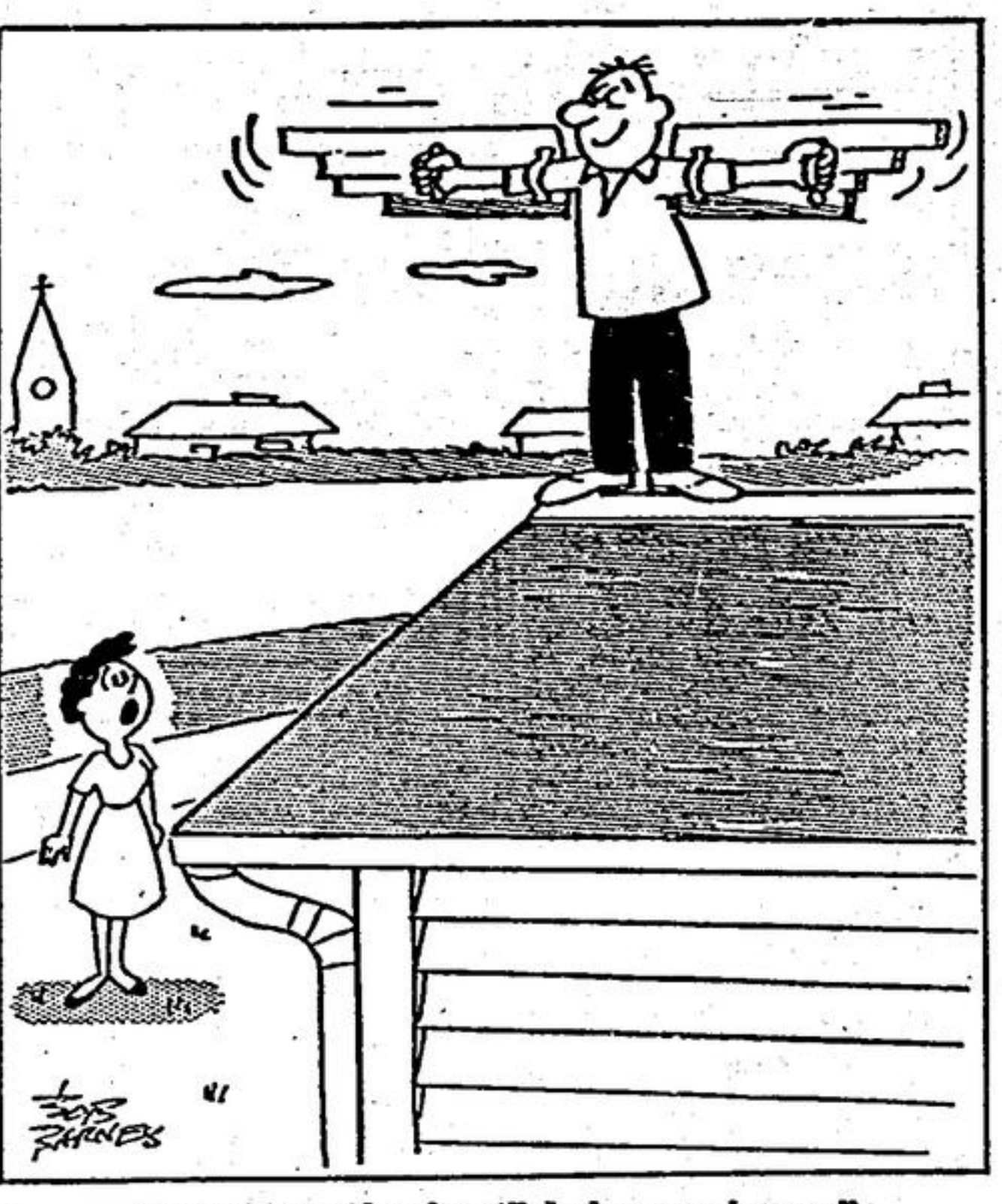
