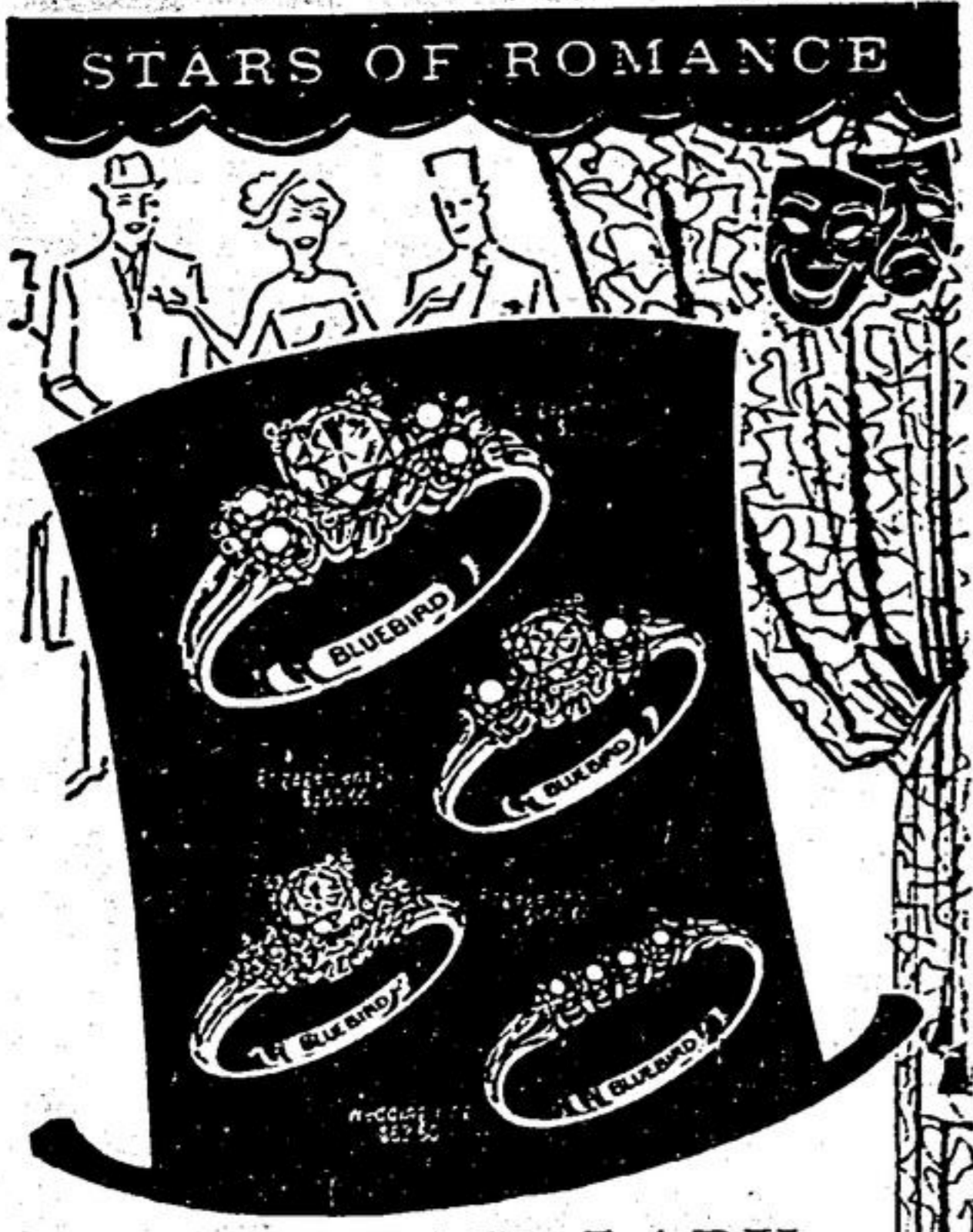


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Markham R.O.A. Leads In Farm Installations

Farm customers in the rural sections of Ontario Hydro's Central Region are leading the province in the amount of modern labor saving electrical equipment being utilized on their farms. Electrical energy consumed on farms in this region is about 10,000 kilowatt hours a year on the average, much higher than in other regions of the province. One of the sectors where the greatest increase in use of electrical equipment is taking place in this region is Markham Rural Operating Area. In the past two months there has been much new equipment introduced such as stable cleaners, brooder installations, feed handling equipment, etc., that would use about 253,520 kilowatt hours of electricity in the bi-monthly period. Additional Hired Hands New electrically-operated farm equipment not only is taking most of the back-breaking drudgery out of farming, but also is speeding up chores and is equivalent to the farmer having several additional hired hands. Dunbarton Forms H. and S. Association

 Last Tuesday evening, Jan. 29, a Home and School Association was formed at the Dunbarton High School. This association is the first in the high schools of Pickering Township. It was formed under the guidance of the Home and School Federation and the district council with the co-operation of Mr. V. Stetler, Principal of the school. The newly elected officers were installed by Mrs. J. Gaskill of Oshawa of the federation. Elected were: President, Mr. Usher, West Rouge, Vice Presidents, Mrs. J. O'Connor, East Woodlands and Mrs. Williamson from Dunbarton. The Secretaries are Mrs. Kirk and Mrs. E. Hull. The treasurer, Mrs. Nicholls, Fairport. Members at large include Mrs. Cooper, Mrs. Dago, Mrs. Hachey and Mr. Horseman. The Association will be called in future, The Dunbarton High School Home and School and Parent Teachers Association. The long name was chosen to include both the public and separate school associations. The first general meeting is planned for after Easter. Until then there will be monthly meetings of the Principal, Executive and interested parents in order to have a working constitution and an educational program to present at the general meeting. While the general aims, objects, rules and set-up of associations in secondary schools are similar to those used in elementary schools, there is nevertheless, some difference in methods, programs and problems. The secondary program should be built around the different situations and problems that arise when children go to high school. There is a great need for understanding and co-operation between parents and teachers, so that they may join personal, educational and vocational guidance for their young people. Wise co-ordination of efforts are needed here and the high school association is the logical group to sponsor it. Parents of the Dunbarton High School area will be notified of the meetings by means of the local papers, radio and TV. We hope that everyone will plan to attend the first general meeting as an interesting program is planned to discuss the new high school curriculum brought forth in the Robart's Plan.

Inquest Finds That Children Suffocated

Three Milliken children died from smoke suffocation in an upstairs bedroom of their 1 1/2 storey home on the morning of Jan. 6th, a coroner's inquest was told in a hearing at Buttonville, Wednesday night. Facts were revealed surrounding the death of only one victim, 9 year old Clara O'Day. Her two sisters, Judy and Cathy also perished in the blaze.

The inquest was conducted by Coroner John Fleming of Markham assisted by Crown Attorney Arieh Armstrong and Sgt. Robt. Hood, Markham Twp. Police Dept. Dr. R. J. Mackey of Scarborough General Hospital said that the victim's body was badly burned but it was smoke asphyxiation that caused her death. Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Soviluk and two other children escaped. Another child was staying with relatives at the time of the tragedy.

Intense Heat
 Wm. Blizard, a member of the Unionville volunteer fire brigade said he arrived at the scene of the fire at about 8:30 a.m. and could see smoke coming from the roof and an upstairs window. He said that he attempted to enter the house through the kitchen but the heat was too intense. He then tried to gain entry through a second floor window but the opening was too small. "I feel no one could have endured such heat," he said.

Donald Macaulay of the Scarborough Fire Department said that he found all three children on a bed in one room. "It was so smoky I couldn't even see the firemen next to me," he said. "No one could have lived in there without a mask," he continued. Asleep Downstairs Mr. Soviluk said that he was asleep in a downstairs bedroom when he was awakened by

By the Corporation of the Village of Stouffville for approval of a by-law relieving certain lands from certain levies for cost of construction of sewers and a sewage disposal plant.

- TAKE NOTICE THAT:
- The Council of the Corporation of the Village of Stouffville intends to apply to the Ontario Municipal Board for an order relieving any assessed parcel of land in the area annexed to the Village of Stouffville pursuant to an order of annexation made by the Ontario Municipal Board dated the 21st day of August, 1962, from payment of the cost of construction of sewers and a sewage disposal plant heretofore constructed in the Village of Stouffville levy for which is provided in debenture by-laws numbers 824, 837 and 832, and a construction by-law number 62-4 unless and until such assessed parcel is connected with the sanitary sewage system of the Village of Stouffville.
 - The total amount remaining to be levied in respect of the said debenture by-laws including principal and interest is \$897,059.50. The amount required to be levied under construction by-law number 62-4 is \$27,279.01 and interest thereon.
 - Any rate-payer may within 21 days after the first publication of this notice send by prepaid post to the Clerk of the Village of Stouffville at the address given below, a notice in writing stating his objection to such order.
 - The Ontario Municipal Board may make such order upon the application of the Village of Stouffville but before doing so it may appoint a time and place for a public hearing when any objections will be considered.
