Kinnari Wins Comm. Lg. Point-Scoring Title For Second Year In Row

For the second straight year, Ringwood rightwinger, Matt Kinnari has won the Stouffville Community League point-scoring championship. He finished the regular on Friday night with 22 goals and 1 assist for 38 points. His point production was only one better than team-mate, Harold Hodgson who fired 16 goals and assisted on 21 for 37 points. Greenwood's Neil Pascoe was third with 31 and "Nebble" Gayman of Markham finished in the fourth spot with 30.

For his efforts, Kinnari will receive an engraved trophy to add to his collection. The big winger also leads the point-scoring parade in the Richmond Hill senior loop. The top thirty players in the league scoring are listed as follows:

Ross Madill Wins Goaltender Award

Ringwood netminder, Ross Madill has won the "Vezina Trophy" of the Stouffville Community Hockey League. In a performance record unequalled in the five year history of the group, the stocky puck-stopper yielded only 1.461 goals per game throughout the entire schedule. He took part in every contest. He chalked up a total of 4 shutouts, three of these coming in the first three games, Oct. 10, Oct. 26 and Nov. 2. He blanked the opposition again on Nov. 23rd. Only on Jan. 18th did he yield five goals, the largest number to evade him in a single contest. He will be presented with a suitably engraved trophy prior to the end of the group playoffs.

Jerry Brett, goaltending sensation with Greenwood-Mt. Zion was the second best with an average of 3.538 goals per game. He was followed closely by Bruce Strong of Ballantrae with an average of 3.545. A break-down of the individual per centage records is as follows:

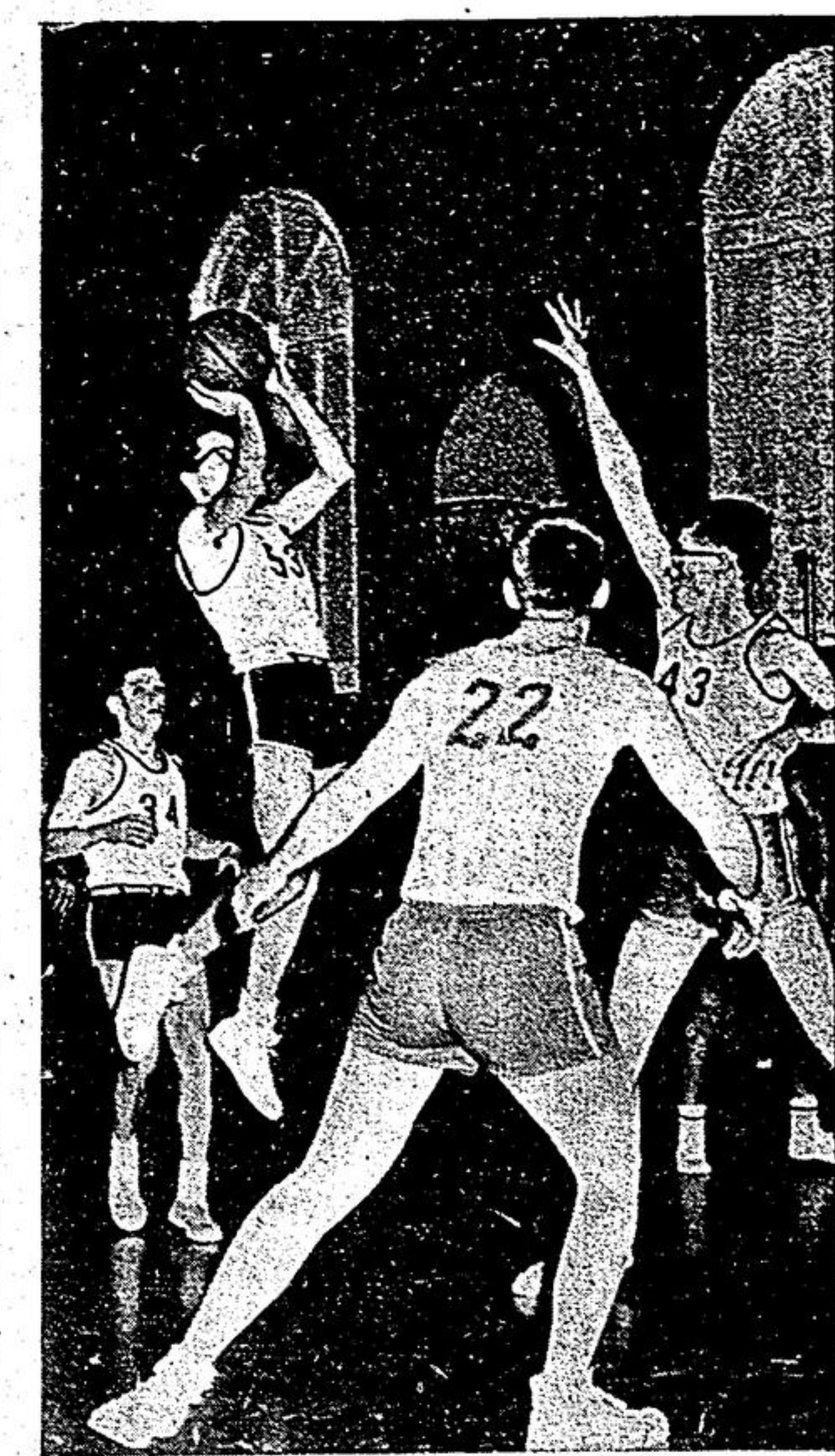


Allan Boyd "scored 2 goals"
