Unhealthy Leaves A Problem of House Plants

The leaves of your house plant indicate its general condition. When the leaves appear unhealthy, lose their colour and curl up or drop off it is time to find the reason. Horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture say that these conditions may be caused by a host of different situations. However, the main causes are watering, chilling, and inadequate light.

Lack of water results in a check in growth, shedding of leaves and unsightly plants with dull, unattractive foliage. Too much water results in a shortage of oxygen in the soil, consequently the roots and plant parts at soil level will rot. To overcome these conditions ensure that plant soil has good aeration and drainage.

A sudden drop in temperature will cause many house-plants to shed their leaves. Tropical plants are particularly susceptible to chilling and should never be exposed to cold draught.

Many plants are susceptible to gas, even the slightest amount of gas in the atmosphere will curl up the leaves. Christmas Cherry and Helixine (Baby's Tears) are highly susceptible.

Inadequate light rarely causes leaves to drop off (but will produce thin straggly

growth and pale coloured leaves. Make sure that plants which thrive best in good light are placed in the sunniest location during the winter months.

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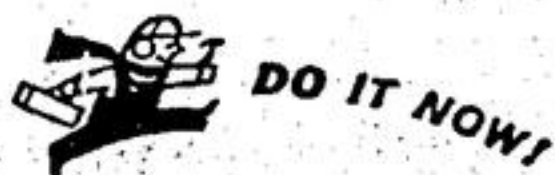
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
