Unhealthy Leaves A Problem of House Plants

very well.

The leaves of your house plant indicate its general condition. When the leaves appear unhealthy, lose their colour and curl up or drop off it is time to find the reason. Horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture say that these conditions may be caused by a host of different situations. However, the main causes are watering, chilling, and inadequate light. quate light.

Lack of water results in a check in growth, shedding of leaves and unsightly plants with dull, unattractive foliage. Too much water results in a shortage of oxygen in the soil, consequently the roots and plant parts at soil level will rot. To, overcome these conditions ensure that plant soil has good acration and drainage.

A sudden drop in temperature will cause many house-plants to shed their leaves. Tropical plants are particularly susceptible to chilling and should never be exposed to cold draught.

Many plants are susceptible to gas, even the slightest amount of gas in the atmos-phere will curl up the leaves. Christmas Cherry and Helxine (Baby's Tears) are highly sus-
