\$22 An Acre Average Cost Of Reforested Land Since 1924

York County has purchased 3,816 acres of land since entering an agreement with the Department of Lands & Forests in 1924, and the average cost per acre has been \$22. The land is located in three municipalities, Whitchurch with 2,539 acres, East Gwillimbury with 641 acres and Georgina with 636 acres. In January of this year, an option was taken on a further 175 acres which, if purchased, will cost \$55 an acre.

In the Forestation Committee report before county council last week, it was recommended that the county continue to pay a grant in lieu of taxes to the three municipalities where reforested lands are located. Winter works projects this year include plantation thinning, woodlot improvement and crop tree pruning.

Three-hundred cords of red pine pulpwood are to be cut from the forest during the winter. All the trees to be removed have been marked and in general represent the poorest and smallest trees in the plantation. This thinning is necessary in order to keep the stand in a healthy fast growing condition. Approximately 100 cords have been cut to date.

Woodlot improvement work has not yet begun, but will commence shortly. In this operation, the poor trees only are marked for cutting in order to improve the quality of the woodlot and to allow younger thrifter trees to take their place. The marked trees are unsuitable for sawlogs and therefore the product obtained will be fuelwood.

Crop tree pruning is a silvicultural treatment whereby the lower branches are removed from selected trees in order to produce high quality knot-free lumber. These crop trees will constitute the harvest at rotation age after all interim thinning have been completed. This winter's crop tree pruning program is almost completed.

Re-plant Fire Area
 As an extra woods operation, the dead trees left as a result of a six acre fire last spring are being cut and burned. This area will be replanted this coming spring.

Increase Fire Protection
 Two ponds were constructed on the forest for fire protection purposes. One was dug in the Bender and Graves Tract and the other in the Headquarters Tract.

Boundary markers have been surveyed by a Department of Lands and Forests surveyor and it is planned to have several other done this coming spring and summer. It would appear desirable, in the future, for the County to have each property surveyed at the time of acquisition.

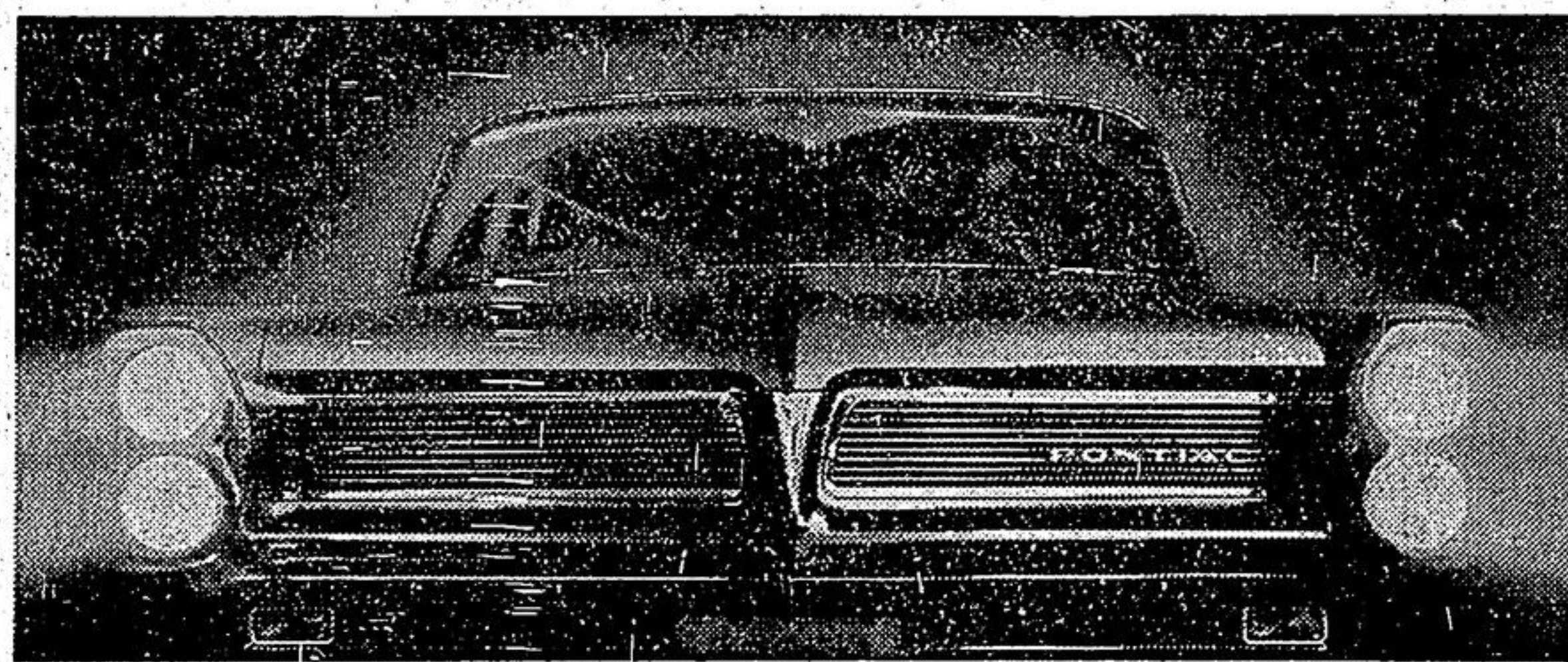

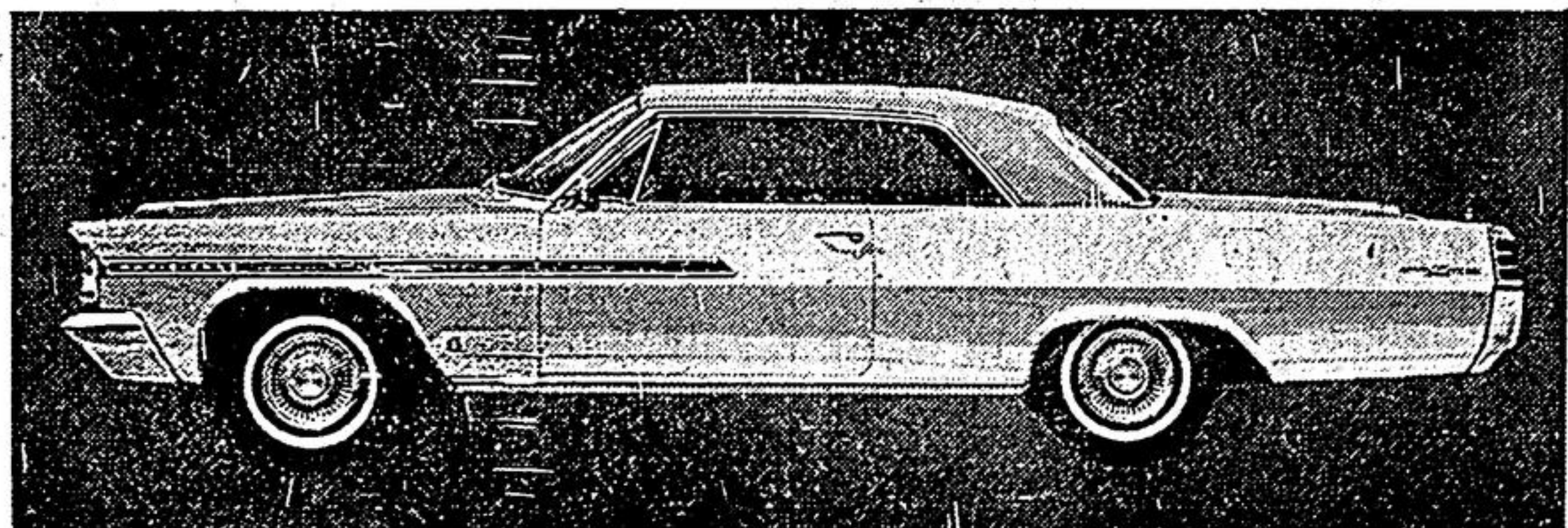
