Cost Of Reforested

In the Forestation Committee report before county council last week, it was recommended that the county continue to pay a grant in lieu of taxes to the three municipalities where forested lands are located.

Winter works projects this year include plantation thinning, woodlot improvement and crop tree pruning.

Three-hundred cords of red pine pulpwood are to be cut from the forest during the winter. All the trees to be removed have been marked and in general represent the poorest and smallest trees in the plantation. This thinning is necessary in order to keep the stand in a healthy fast growing condition.
Approximately 100 cords have been cut to date.

Woodlot improvement work has not yet begun, but will commence shortly. In this operation, the poor trees only are marked for cutting in order to Hingston, owing to the latter's improve the quality of the wood- ill health. lot and to allow younger thrifti- Messrs. er trees to take their place. The marked trees are unsuitable for sawlogs and therefore the pro-

duct obtained will be fuelwood. Crop tree pruning is a silvicultural treatment whereby the lower branches are removed from selected trees in order to produce high quality knot-free lumber. These crop trees will constitute the harvest at rotation age after all interim thinnings have been completed. This winter's crop tree pruning program is almost completed.
