

# Aurora Jrs. Here Thursday In Group Playoff Semi-Final

In a spine-tingling contest that had both Aurora and Stouffville fans sitting on the edge of their seats for an entire sixty minutes plus overtime, the Junior "Clippers" edged the league-leaders 4-3 on Tuesday night in the first game of the group semi-finals. The return tilt will be played in Stouffville on Thursday night (tonight) at 8:30 p.m.

Leftwing speedster John Saunders was the hero for the home-town squad. He fired the winner at the six minute mark of the overtime session. Allan Boyd, Rich. Conlin and Travis Sugden were the other marksmen for the winners. Charlie Leeming with a pair, paced the Aurora attack. Roy Pugh counted one.

The two teams were evenly matched and the sea-saw score indicated the play. Stouffville's Glenn Jackson turned in a superb performance in the "Clipper" cage and in the dying minutes of regulation time he blocked breakaway bids by both Leeming and Pugh. The series is a best 3 out of 5 games.

Allan Boyd put Stouffville out front 1-0 only to have Roy Pugh tie it up eight minutes later. Before the first period had ended, Rich. Conlin had scored for the "Clippers" and Leeming had blinked the light for Aurora. The frame ended in a 2-2 tie.

Travis Sugden, currently setting a torrid front-line pace for the Clippers picked up his sixth goal and eleventh point in four games to give Stouffville a 3-2 lead. Leeming evened the count to send the clubs into overtime. This set the stage for John Saunders' climactic winner. He was mobbed by his jubilant mates.

In the group's other semi-final series, Newmarket has been paired off with Orangeville. Uxbridge has dropped back into Junior "D" ranks.

Stouffville's Bantam hockey team made a clean 3-game sweep of an all-day tournament at Cannington on Saturday, beating Cannington 4-2; Little Britain 3-1 and Uxbridge 4-3. It was a two-fold victory for the local squad. They not only took the tournament trophy away from the defending champion Uxbridge team but they defeated the same club that had ousted them from the group playoff series only one week before.

A total of eight clubs were entered including—Millbrook, Sunderland, Port Perry, Uxbridge, Cannington, Stouffville, Cambray and Little Britain. Peter Turner was Stouffville's most potent marksman, netting three goals. David Ferguson, Robt. Slack and David Glover each potted a pair. Single tallies came from the sticks of Pat Smith and Larry Plaskitt.

One of the features of the tourney was the play of Stouffville's Peewee netminder, Harold Crowder. He performed in the contest against Little Britain and held the rivals to one goal. The Stouffville Midgets joined their Bantam cousins on the shelf last week when they dropped a 3-1 "rubber game" to Port Perry in the group playoffs. The series was deadlocked at one win apiece prior to the all-important contest on Wednesday.

Great goaltending by Port Perry's Roger Stephens and minus the team's number one marksman, Francis Haylow, Stouffville entered the contest at a disadvantage. Haylow, a 22-goal man this season failed to put in an appearance and forced coach Harold Hodgson to shake up his front lines. The left-winger's absence was openly resented by the management and

the majority of the players. Port Perry held a 3-0 lead going into the final frame. Wayne Keeler blasted the lone Stouffville puck past the agile Stephens, picking up his own rebound and firing it home.

The local squad played well but were noticeably disorganized throughout much of the contest. They had several good chances to score but with the exception of Keeler's drive, all shots were blocked.

An excellent start has already been made on the prospect to wear Christmas to a frazzle before it gets here.

## Francis Haylow Leading Scorer For Midgets

Leftwinger, Francis Haylow fired a total of 22 goals during the regular Midget schedule and playoffs that concluded with a 3-1 loss in Port Perry on Wednesday night. It was this same leading marksman who failed to attend the "rubber match" that sent the Stouffville club to the early season show-ers.

In addition to the 22 tallies, Haylow also collected 10 assists for 32 points. Most significant was the point-scoring effort of Stouffville's Ken Aida. As a defenceman he scored 9 goals and assisted on 12 others for 21 points. Tom Benson was third with 9 goals and 6 assists for 15 point.

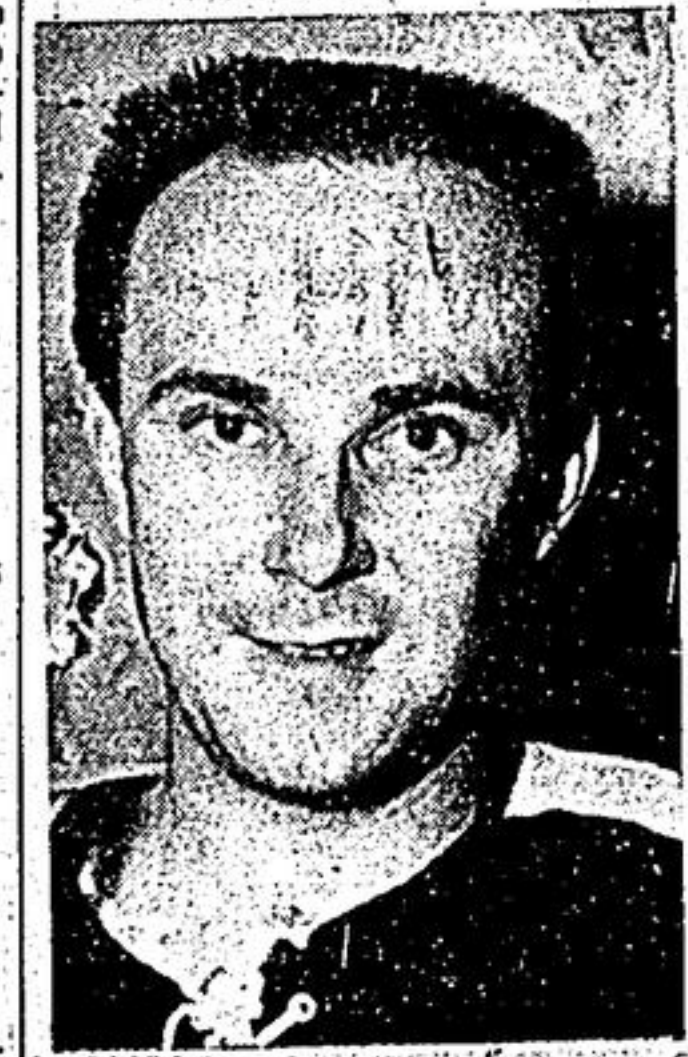
