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Conservation Budget For '63 \$1,769,995

The 55-member Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority approved a 1963 general conservation budget of \$1,769,995 and a capital flood control budget of \$6,170,732 at its budget meeting last week (at the Markham Township municipal council chambers).

The general conservation budget includes \$545,755 for the purchase and development of conservation area lands; \$36,000 for continued development of Pioneer Village at Jane St. and Steeles Ave., and \$46,000 on general engineering and water control studies.

It is expected that the Ontario Government will contribute about \$895,000 in grants towards the general budget. Per capita cost amounts to about

40 cents based on an estimated population figure of 1,755,000 within the 1,000 square-mile Authority boundaries.

The flood control budget is the 1963 portion of the \$38,000,000 flood control and water conservation scheme which is being shared by the Federal and Ontario governments and the conservation authority over a 10-year period. The 1963 budget is expected to receive some \$4,000,000 in federal and provincial grants.

Other items dealt with by the Authority: Approved 1963 flood and water conservation capital levy for benefiting municipalities totalling \$833,000, plus an \$83,000 levy on Metro Toronto for the \$4,000,000 Elack Creek project now underway.

The Young Peoples group enjoyed a tobogganing party Saturday evening and afterwards had lunch (pancakes and maple syrup) at the home of Don Boake.

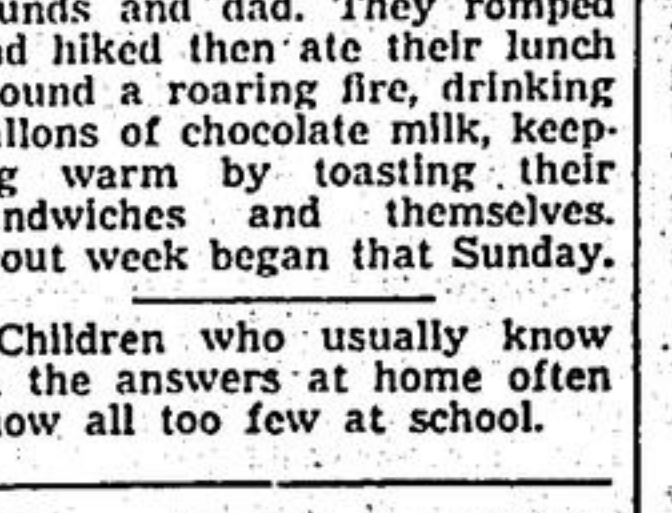
Keep in mind Glasgow Home and School this Friday evening. Parents are invited to see the pupils work on display and talk to the teachers.
