Garden Hints

When you are spreading salt on the driveway or footpath be careful not to scatter it on the flower beds and grass, warn horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

With frequent use during the winter, sodium chloride and calcium chloride will accumulate, eventually they may seep down into the soil and cause root injury to trees and shrubs.

If you have not checked your gladiolus corms recently now is the time to do so. Gladiolus thrives over winter on corms in storage and if conditions are suitable they will feed and multiply. Their presence can be detected by brown markings on the surface of the corms. Horticulturist with the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture advise dusting infected corms with 5% D.D.T. dust. Throw out any corms that show signs of disease, such as brown scabs, or brown spots with small gray centres. These corms will probably develop Sclerotinia dry rot or scab.

Plant Your Tuberos-rooted Begonias Now

Most tuberos-rooted begonias are beautiful dwarf plants with frilled or ruffled flowers of white, pink, salmon yellow, orange or red. Tubers may be started any time from now to April, advise horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Place the tubers in flats containing a soil mixture of half The crowns of the tubers should be exposed. Apply water sparingly until growth starts, and then water more freely.

When growth is 1/2 to 2 inches long, place the tubers in 4 to 5 inch pots using a soil mixture of one part soil, 1 part peat or leaf mould and one-half part sand. Plant at the same depth as in the flats. Try to keep the plants growing slowly to prevent spindly growth. Ideal conditions are a temperature of 60°F, high humidity and moderate light. Direct sunlight can be injurious to the foliage.

Begonias flower from June to September. After the plants have flowered cut them half way back on the stem and leave them in almost dry soil. Store in a cool place at 45°F. until the following February, when they may be re-started.

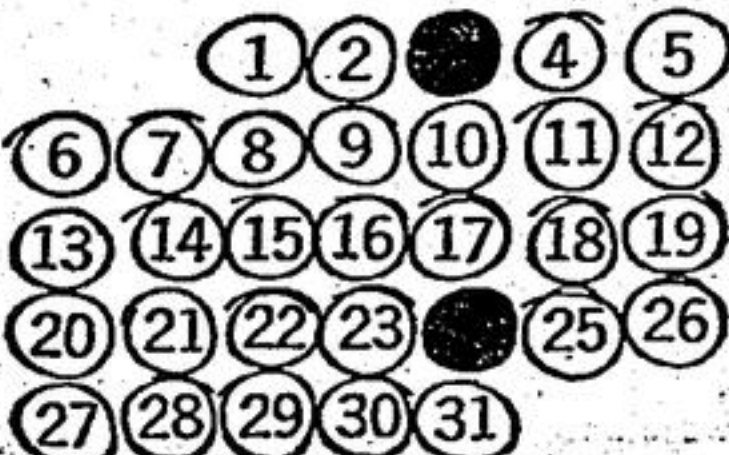

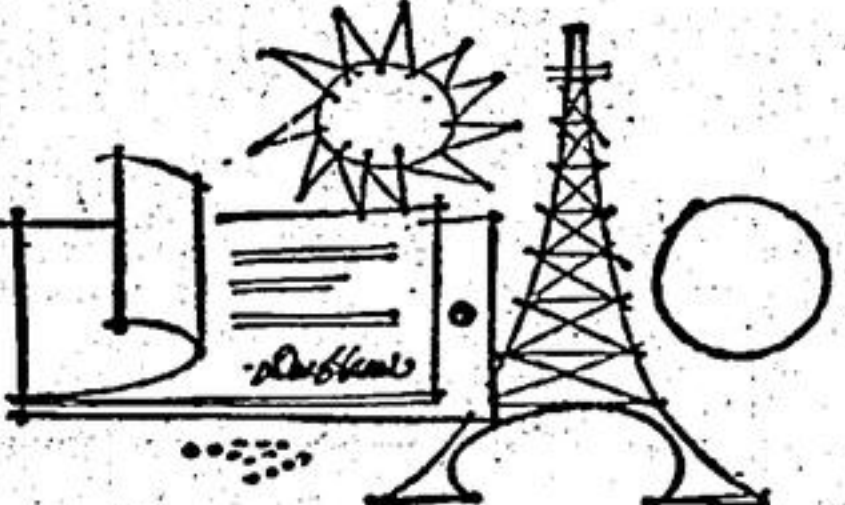

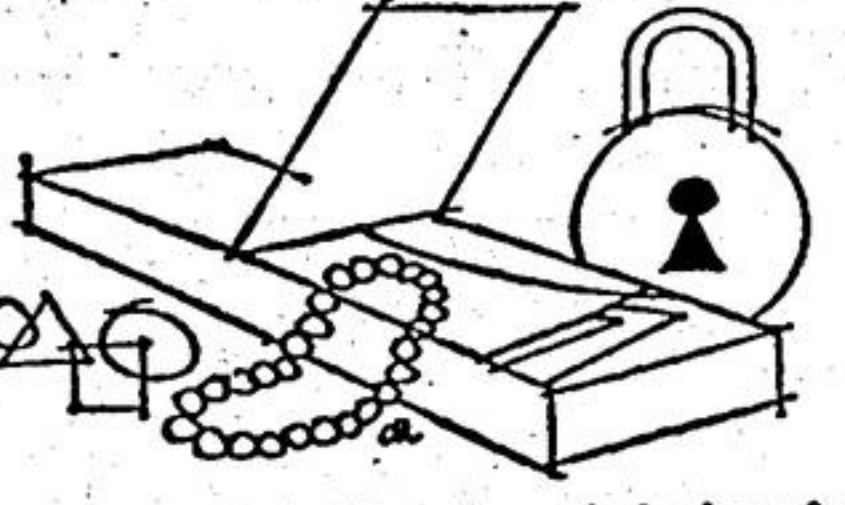
