

Orangeville Puts Clippers "On The Ropes"; Win Fourth Game 7-3

Play Again Thursday

The Clippers will be fighting with their backs to the wall when they travel to Orangeville on Thursday (tonight) for the fifth game of the Jr. "C" group finals. They trail in the series 3 games to 1 after absorbing a one-sided 7-3 setback on Stouffville ice Tuesday.

The free-wheeling Orangeville squad carried the play throughout much of the sixty minutes and their four goal lead was well earned. The Clippers who fore-checked Aurora off their skates in the semi-finals appeared satisfied to sit back and let their rivals organize their offensive. By then it was too late. With three-man attacks, the visitors cruised in over the Stouffville blueline almost unmolested and netminder Glenn Jackson was too often the lone defender. A crowd of 397 attended the contest.

Match Penalty

To top off a rather lack-lustre performance, Stouffville's Larry Garner nearly decapitated Orangeville's Mel Townley in the final minute of the game. With referee Jack Shropshire looking on, Garner swung his stick like a baseball bat and only a split-second deflection saved the Orangeville lad from a very serious injury. Garner's stick was snapped in two by the impact of the blow. The infraction carries an automatic suspension until the case is reviewed by the O.H.A. For the heady young forward, it was a regrettable incident that gained him little sympathy from the near-400 fans who witnessed the occurrence. Throughout the regular schedule and the season, he has been one of the Clippers' most prominent goal-scorers. Excluding a ten minute misconduct penalty to Stouffville rearguard Jim Hood, 18 other players made two-minute trips to the sin-bin.

Seven In A Row

Stan Feasby of the Clippers raised the hopes of local supporters after only 34 seconds of the opening period with a goal from Grant Foreman. What happened after that, only goaltender Jackson can recall as Orangeville pounded seven pucks in a row into the Clipper cage. Wayne Watson paced the visitors with a pair. Singles came from the sticks of Dave Evans, Morley Watson, Keith Rutledge, Gary Poynter and Deorwin Storey. John Roxborough and Larry Garner were credited with Stouffville's second and third tallies.

Ringwood Wins Berth In Playoff Finals; Win With Only 8 Men

Ringwood, the defending champs in the Stouffville Community Hockey League contest only 8 men on Friday night but they were still good enough to edge Stouffville "Merchants" 4-3 in a tight struggle. The victory advanced Ringwood to the group finals. They will now meet either Greenwood or Ballantrae for the Title.

Stouffville coach, Alex Wilkins had the largest turnout of player personnel this season but they spotted Ringwood a four goal lead and couldn't catch up. Jim Cruickshank, Jack Arnold and Con Phinney lifted pucks into the Ringwood net in the final frame but they failed to notch the equalizer. Goalie Geo. Wilkins was pulled from his post with 56 seconds to go but Ross Madill staved off a torrid Stouffville attack to preserve Ringwood's season-long win streak.

Harold Hodgson potted a pair of goals for Ringwood, his 8th and 9th of the current playoffs. Matt Kinnari and Jim Cabell scored singles. Stouffville out-shot Ringwood 27 to 21. Stouffville's usual keen shooting around their opponent's net was missing in Friday's contest. Their drives were repeatedly off the target. Other shots were blocked by Madill that were labelled all the way.

Ski Resort Operator Confident Of "Gold" In Hills Of Dagmar

Thirty-one year old Brian Rowley, operator this winter of the Ski-Loft ski resort north of Balsam in Uxbridge Twp., is confident that there is "gold" in the hills of Dagmar.

"All it takes, is a little initiative and enthusiasm," he said. In a recent interview with The Tribune.

Mr. Rowley, an ardent skier and a resident of Toronto said he returned last year from an overseas skiing expedition to find the Dagmar resort centre closed down and a padlock on the front door of the main lodge. This winter, he made up his mind that he would re-open the once-popular "skiers' paradise" and operate it on a private membership basis. Thirty four persons were enrolled at reasonable rates of \$30 per family or \$20 per individual for an entire season. Mr. Rowley said that his profits were not excessive but he did not lose anything. "I just wanted to prove that it could be done," he said. The Ski-Loft premises is owned by Mr. Howard Langelie of

Scarboro, a physical training instructor at the University of Toronto.

A Good Winter
Although there was not an abundance of snow in this area during the past winter, Mr. Rowley claims it has been the best season for skiing at Dagmar since 1957. There have been few ice storms, a problem that plagues ski resorts every year.

Mr. Rowley feels that Dagmar is one of the best private clubs in Southern Ontario and certainly one of the most economical. If he decides to continue the program next winter, it is likely that the rates will be increased to cover the cost of a new ski-lift and other necessary conveniences.

The influx of private members was acquired only by "word of mouth" advertising. No brochures or pamphlets were circulated. "The whole thing just snowballed," said Instructor Rowley. Mr. John Houston of Stouffville is a member and one of the resort's most capable skiers. Several
