Reports given at the recent United Missionary Society Board Meeting held in the Markham United Missionary Church last week, indicate that the U.M.S. has had another good year. Mr. Clayton Cressman, Kitchener, Ont., Treasurer reported that receipts during the past year had reached an all time high when \$362,512.00 had been received into the General Treasurer. Besides this the Woman's Missionary Society Treasurer reported that the ladies had given over \$84,000.00 for all purposes. Of this amount \$60,000.00 went directly into the W.M.S. project fund out of which 21 missionaries are supported and a number of other projects carried out on the various mission fields where the U.M.S. has missionaries.

Reports were read from the various field superintendents in Nigeria, Brazil, India and Mexico. These all indicated unlimited opportunities for missionary service. The U.M.C. has a missionary on some foreign field for approximately every 100 members at home with others being sent out to increase the missionary force this coming year.
