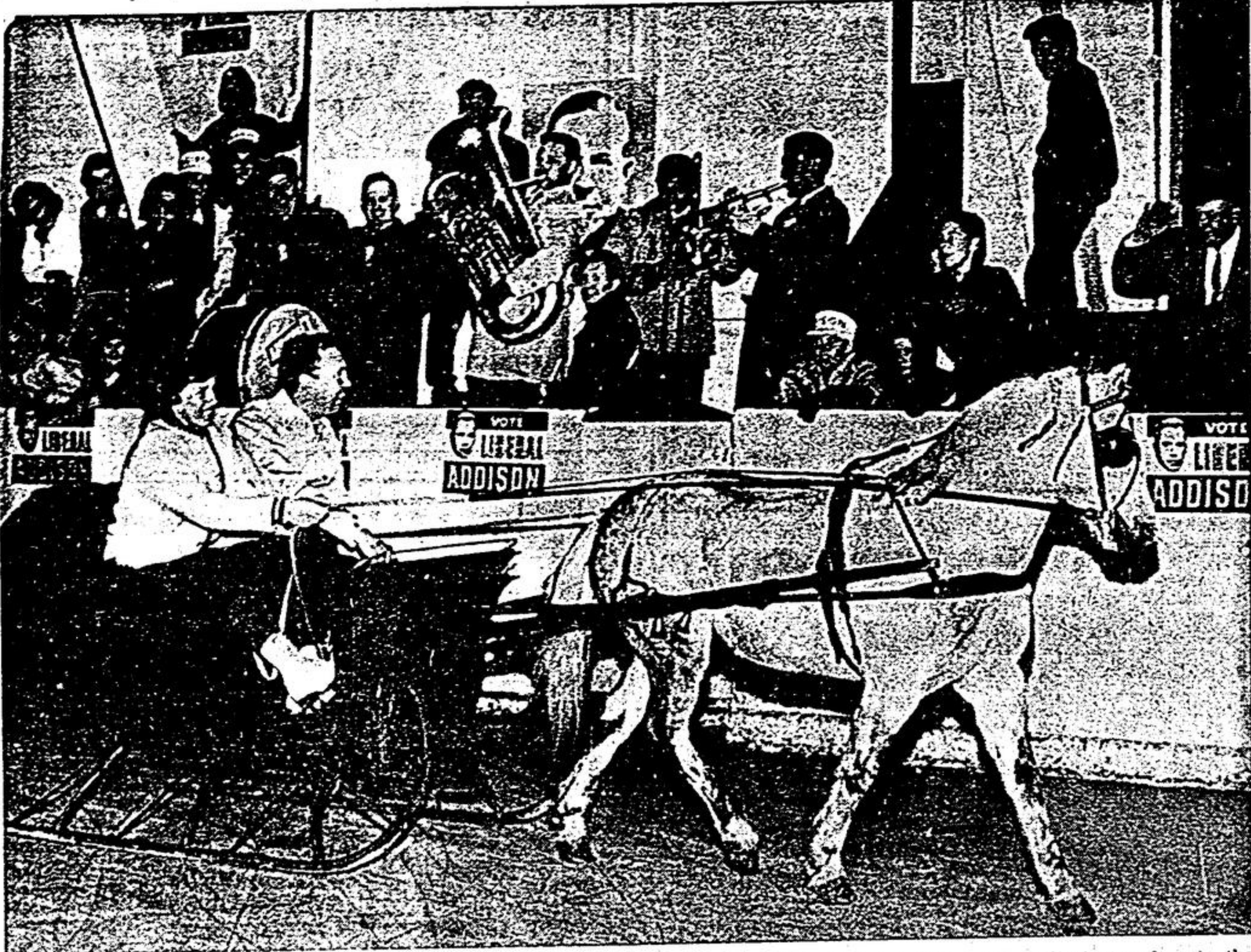


Campaigns By Horse and Cutter

Plans Sketched In Sand Lead To Beautiful Lemonville Home

Eleven years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Reginald G. Fairbanks purchased a fifty acre parcel of land from the late Austin Yake, conc. 7, Whitchurch Twp., south of Lemonville. They erected a temporary cottage residence on the property with the dream that some day, the site would become their permanent home. That dream has come true: From roughly sketched plans scratched out in the sands of a nearby man-made pond, has emerged a beautiful T-shaped dwelling, eye-catching in every detail but still practical for every purpose. The builder was, Mr. Harley Warner of Toronto.

Work on the structure was started in July of last year and it was completed in December. Mr. and Mrs. Fairbanks have since sold their home in York Mills. The second storey living room looks out through giant picture windows onto two ponds separated by a dam and children's swimming pool. The wall panelling is in natural California redwood and upstairs, four giant beams of B.C. fir run the length of the cottage-shaped ceiling. Mr. Fairbanks, is a painter in his spare time and his works of art are tastefully located throughout the house.

Flowing Fountain
At the base of a winding staircase is a fresh-water fountain that bubbles into a cut stone rock garden at the flick of a switch. A large upstairs skylight keeps the flowers and plants flourishing both summer and winter. A potted fig tree grows nearby. The home has two large fireplaces and is heated by two separate furnaces, both individually controlled. Both Mr. and Mrs. Fairbanks are lovers of music. Their Hi-Fi set is a decorative unit complete with ten speakers cleverly concealed in the walls. Mr. Fairbanks' study is separated from the downstairs family room by folding doors. He has his own workshop and greenhouse. "He knew what he wanted," said Mrs. Fairbanks. She said that her husband drew up the sketch plans and presented them to an architect for final approval. Mr. Fairbanks drives to and from Toronto every day. He is a manufacturer by profession with the Fairbanks Soap Co. They have one son, Earl, in Toronto and five grandchildren. Every summer, the Fairbanks open their country home to senior citizens from Toronto. They arrive by bus and the welcomed warmth of their hosts' hospitality makes the occasion one of long-lasting appreciation. With the approach of spring, the Fairbanks' beauty spot is further enhanced by mother nature. This will provide the owner with still another outlet for his energy as he turns his attention towards the activities out of doors.
