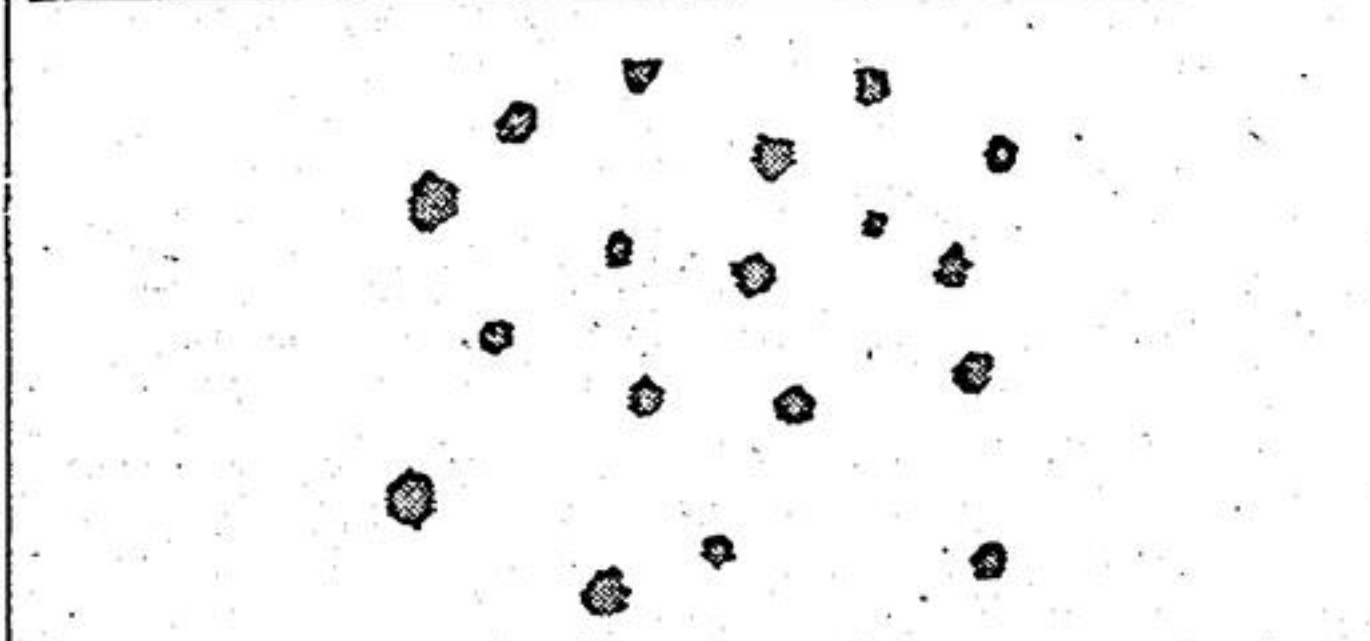

The family purchased the Joe Forsyth farm at Balsam and later moved to Brooklin.

The late Mr. Besse attended public school in Claremont, Cedar Creek and Brooklin. As a very young boy, he was a talented singer and would render solo selections in the Claremont Baptist Church. He

Rural Safety Competition

The Ontario County Farm Safety Council is sponsoring a Rural Highway Safety Display Competition. The main purpose of this competition is to get ideas that can be incorporated into a rural highway safety display that the Farm Safety Council is planning to design and build.

This Rural Highway Safety Competition is open to all residents of Ontario County. Each entry is to consist of three designs—one design suitable for the centre section of the display, and two designs suitable for the left and right wings of the display.

Words or sentences may be used to assist in the meaning of the designs.

The prize money for this competition is — First prize \$120, second prize \$100, third prize \$50, and 4th to 8th prizes \$20 each.

Entries are to be mailed to the Ontario Department of Agriculture, Uxbridge, by June 29.

This competition is sponsored by the Ontario County Farm Safety Council, and the Committee in charge is — Mrs. Walter Carruthers, Norman Smith, Gordon Ewen, Heber Down, and Lynn Fair.

On Saturday, April 6th, the Ontario County Seed Judging Competition was held in the Uxbridge High School. During the afternoon program, the contestants were required to give oral reasons on four of the six classes judged in the morning.
