

PUBLIC NOTICE

Setting of Grass Fires Township of Pickering

BY-LAW No. 2397 PROVIDES:

- 1. No person may start a fire on a public highway.
- 2. No person may start a fire to burn grass, leaves, etc., except in an incinerator without first informing the local Fire Chief or his deputy.
- 3. No person may start a fire to burn grass or leaves, etc., without first taking reasonable precautions: (a) a sufficient number of persons available to control. (b) have water available. (c) not light such fire if there is a dangerous wind.
- 4. No person may start or permit a fire to burn within 20 feet of a wooden building, nor 15 feet from any other

Any person contravening this By-Law subject to a fine of \$50.00 and costs.


