## Risebrough Auction Sales Over \$10,000

Sales totalled over \$10,000 at the farm auction on the property of Wm. Risebrough, No. 48 Hwy., south of Dickson's Hill on Tuesday. Two rings were set up with Ken Prentice in charge of the sales of livestock and implements and brother Clarke calling the bids on the household effects. The Risebrough farm has been sold and the owner will take up residence in Stouffville early in May.

Although the majority of farmers are in the midst of spring seeding operations, the crowd was exceptionally large. The entire sale that started shortly after 12 o'clock noon, was completed by 5 p.m.

The highest cow in the herd of 24 brought \$225. One tractor sold for \$650 and the other brought \$575. The drill went for \$425; bale elevator, \$250; cultivator, \$175; manure spreader, \$250 and a plow, \$125. The straw sold for 20c per bale.

At the house, a centre table brought a high bid of \$58; an antique lawn seat sold for \$30; a small pickle jar brought \$12 and dishes sold for \$3.00. The dinner bell brought \$39.00. The Peach's Church had a booth on the grounds and their profits totalled \$57.00.

## To "Black List" Snow Removal Delinquents

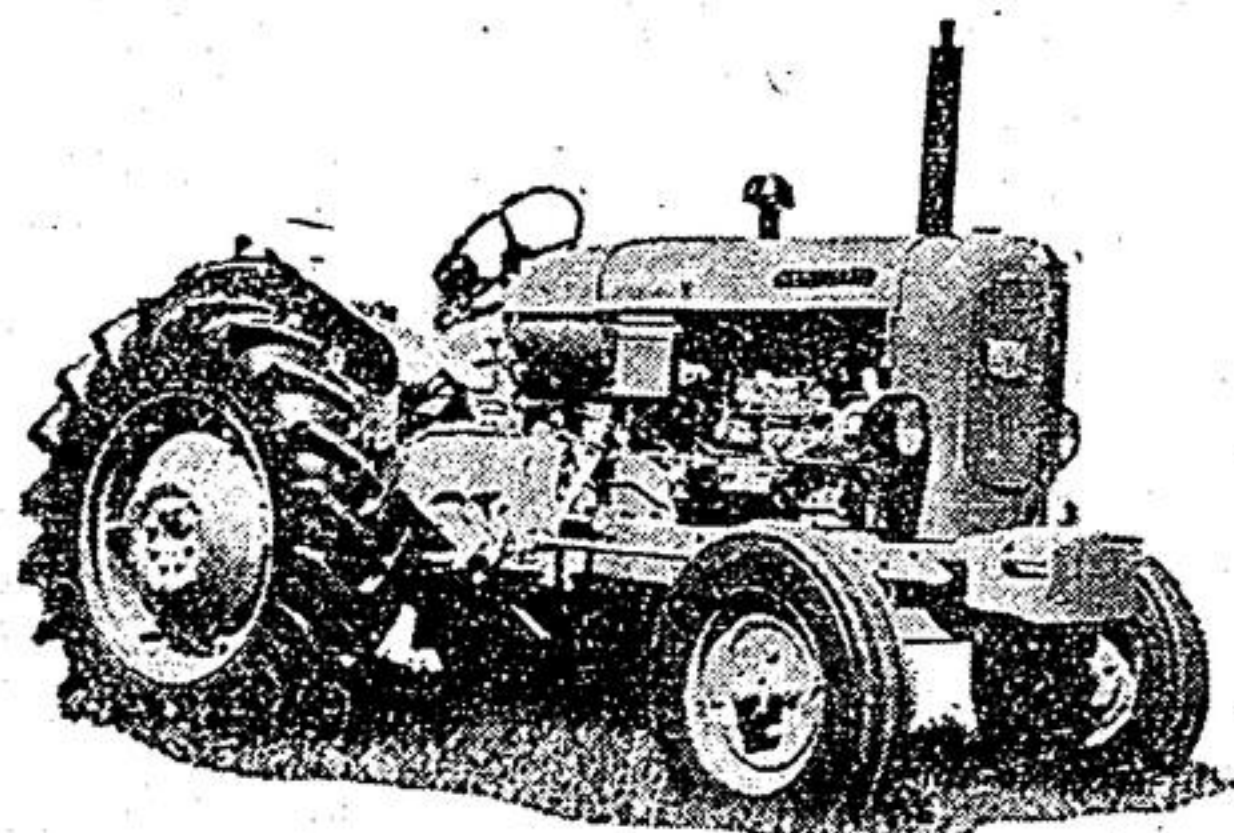
## GREENWOOD CAN TAKE ORHA TITLE THURSDAY

## Whitchurch Tp. Council Discusses Zoning With Planning Board

Whitchurch Township council spent some time last week discussing zoning features of a township master plan and land use bylaw. Deputy-reeve Ross Farquharson is council's representative on the Planning Board and he was present along with Reeve Frank Williams, and members Herb Simpson, Alf Marshal, Lambert Willson and J. R. Bousfield, planning consultant.

Mr. Bousfield continues to regard that any large development or sub-division in the twp. should be located adjacent to the presently organized urban areas or towns. Being thus located such developments might find they could secure municipal services. It was on this point that the official plan ran aground in 1961 since Reeve Wallwork did not share this opinion.

The Board agreed that the exception to this rule would be in the case of large ravine developments with lots of from one to five acres.

Mr. Bousfield pointed out to the meeting that with the government selling lake lots from Crown Land, it would be necessary for the government to bring in legislation giving direction to the administration. He did not believe that the zoning in all cottage areas needed to be the same.
