Speaking this evening at 8 p.m. in the Markham U. M. Church will be the Rev. Richard Ummel. Mr. Ummel will be representing the Brazilian Field of the United Missionary Society. He will also be showing coloured slides depicting missionary work in the interior of Brazil where the Ummels have lived for the last five years.

On Sunday morning, missionary speaker in the Dickson's Hill Church at 9:45 and in the Markham Church at 11:00 a.m. will be Mrs. Edna Brubacher from Nigeria. She first went to Nigeria in 1939 with her husband the late Elgin Brubacher who died there after four years of missionary service.
