Following the advice from the provincial government that no permission would be granted to remove the six southern municipalities of York County out of the Metro Planning area, little progress resulted when the planning committee presented its report at a night sitting of council last week. Chairman of the committee is deputy reeve Jesse Bryson of Vaughan Township.

Council would not go along with the committee's recommendation that a Planning Consultant be engaged. Since most of the immediate planning is required in the six southern municipalities now in Metro, it was believed such a consultant would have little authority.

However, the committee scaled down their recommendation to hiring a consultant in an advisory capacity for such times as required. Council was still not favorable inclined and the question was referred back to the committee for further consideration.

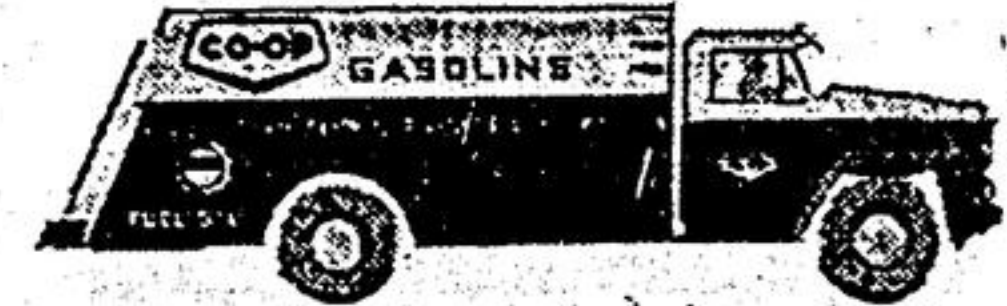
