Legislation Would Protect Farmers From Hunters

New legislation to provide compensation for damage to property by hunters was introduced by Agriculture Minister, Wm. A Stewart last week. This tollows earlier stiffening of penalties under the Ontario Game and Fisheries Act which should provide greater protection for farmers against irresponsible

This new act makes it possible for persons who have livestock killed or injured or property damaged, to apply to the Minister of Agriculture for compensation. The Minister may then take action against the persons responsible to recover payments to farmers for

damages. .Mr. Stewart said he had been concerned for some time about damage caused by some hunters and he had been informed that responsible hunters were also concerned. Farmers should not be asked to be responsible for damages and this act, the Minister felt would relieve them. "This legislation," he said, "will make it possible for the Crown to recover costs, and this along with stiffer penalties, should act as a deterrent to those who think they can ignore the prop-

erty rights of farm people. Compensation payments are limited to the market value of the livestock or property. The act stipulates that the government can appoint valuers to appraise the injury or damage.
