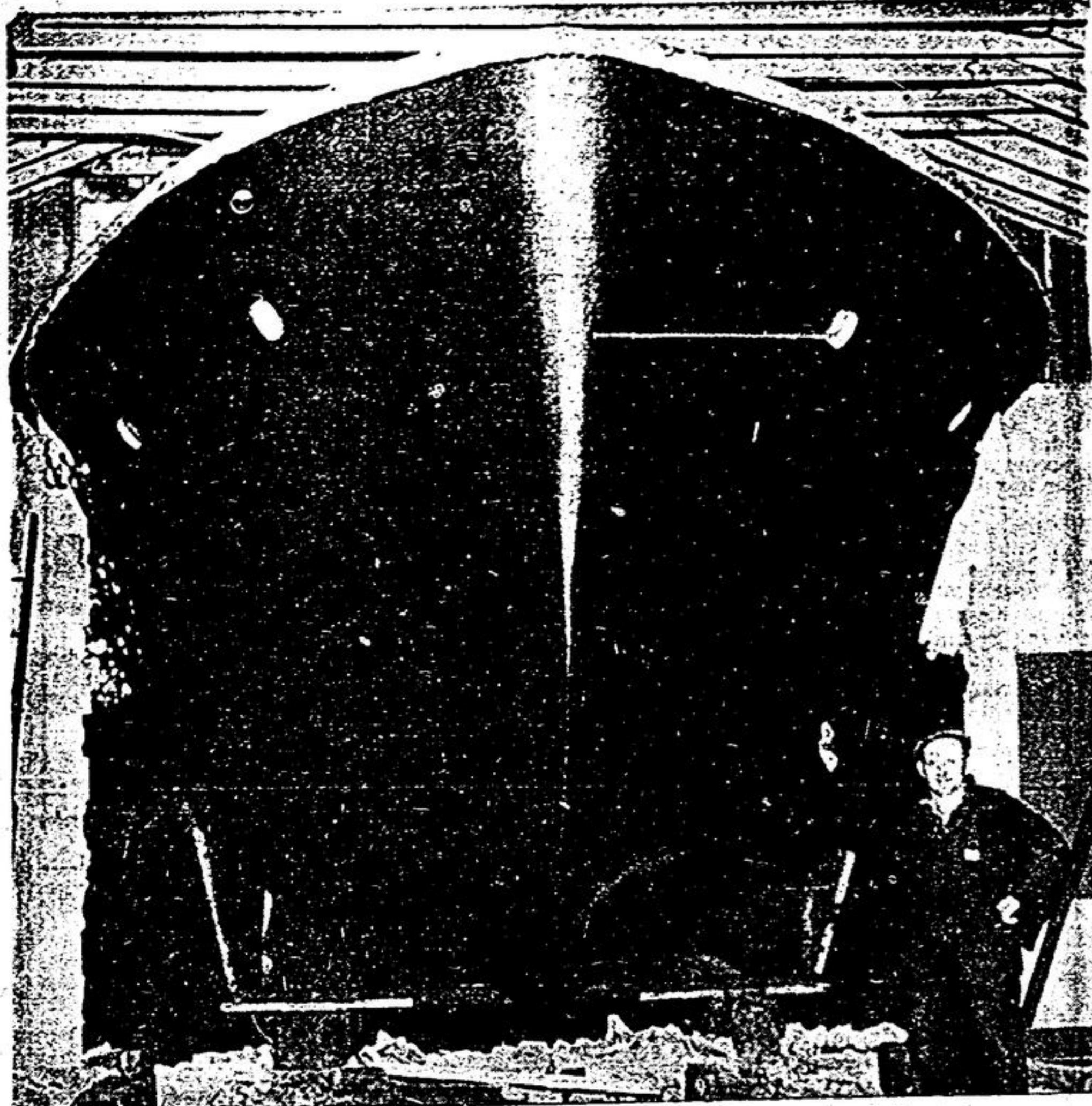


Too Big For It's Building

Mrs. Webb and Miss Ketola gave reports from the convention held at Kingston and told of visiting the local mental institution. Mr. Hodgson informed the members a location has been found for the adult workshop, which is expected to open in the fall. A further "drive for funds" will be necessary to equip this workshop, and work geared to the level of retarded adults must be organized. There is a need for such a program for the retarded adults, who are no longer included in the schools. There is no government grant to cover these workshops, they are completely dependent on the communities.
