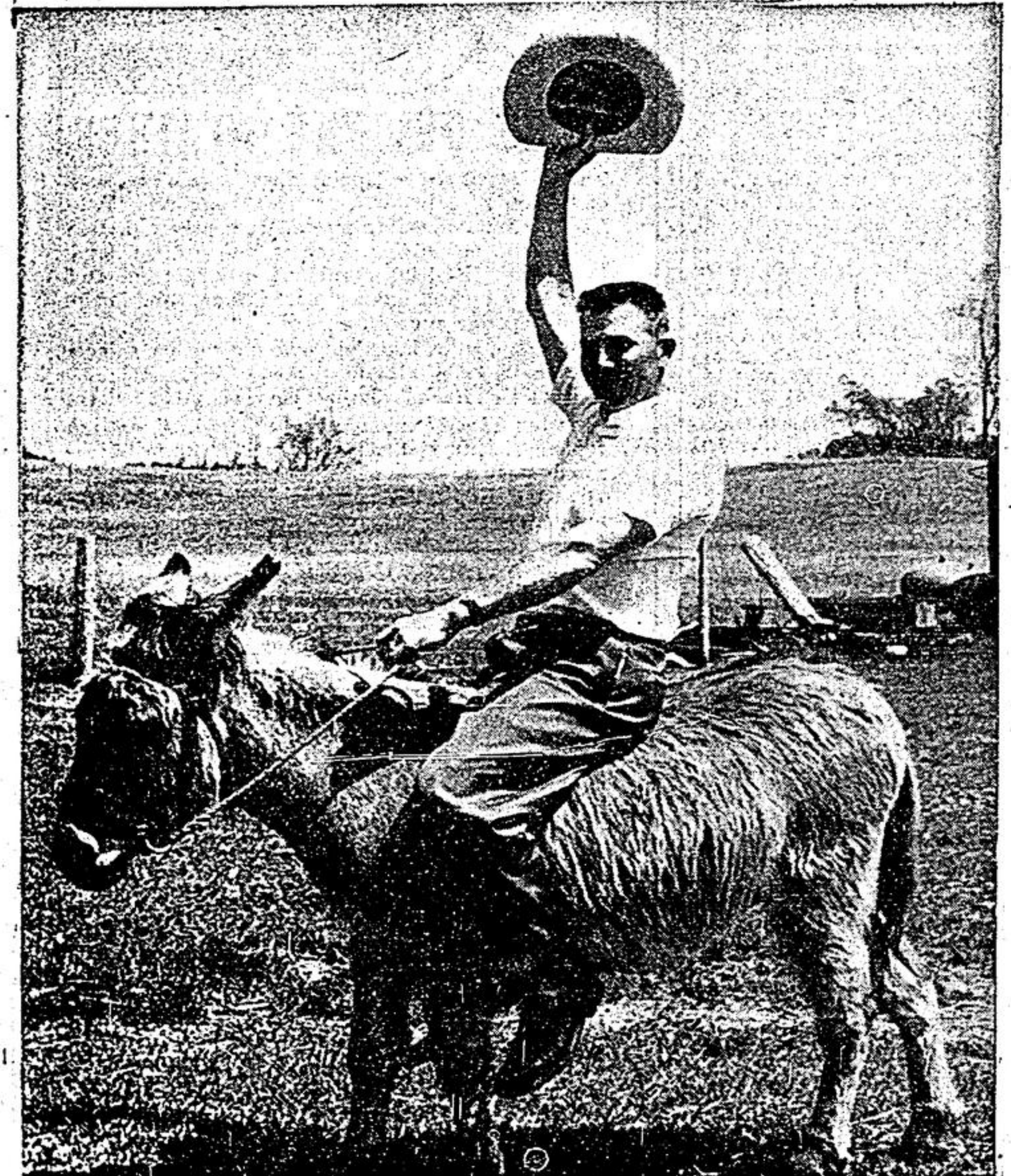

Editor's Mail

Editor's Mail
Stouffville, Ont., June 4, 1963

The Editor, The Stouffville Tribune,
Dear Sir:
Many of us were shocked, then infuriated to read the glaring headlines of a Toronto Daily newspaper last Monday—"I Must Weep for Youth of Stouffville—Pastor" and the "Special to the Star" biased report of statements made in Stouffville by a minister last Sunday evening. In the first of a series of sermons directed to the young people of his congregation, Mr. Gooderham was speaking frankly and sincerely on the problems of youth. As clergymen do, he made some very pointed remarks about the morals and behaviour of young people generally and referred to local gossip in particular. Ministers in my youth (and that was some time ago) were preaching the very same sermons.
What deeply concerns us in this instance, is the miserable, narrow thinking of a reporter who would take one or two statements, out of context, on which to build a sensational newspaper story to broadcast to the whole country, implying that Stouffville is a bed of youthful iniquity. The "one night of passion which could threaten an entire lifetime" which was quoted, is a theme which has been drummed into the ears of young people of every generation. Pregnancies of unmarried girls has meant heartbreak to parents and their daughters since Biblical times. But a report to a daily newspaper labelling the young people of our little village as the youth for whom a pastor weeps is an outrage against all the fine teenagers in Stouffville; an outrage to which I take vehement exception. I weep for the poor ignorant, scandal-monger who presumes to expose all the young people of Stouffville to the pity, ridicule and scorn of the whole country—and I'm fighting mad!
