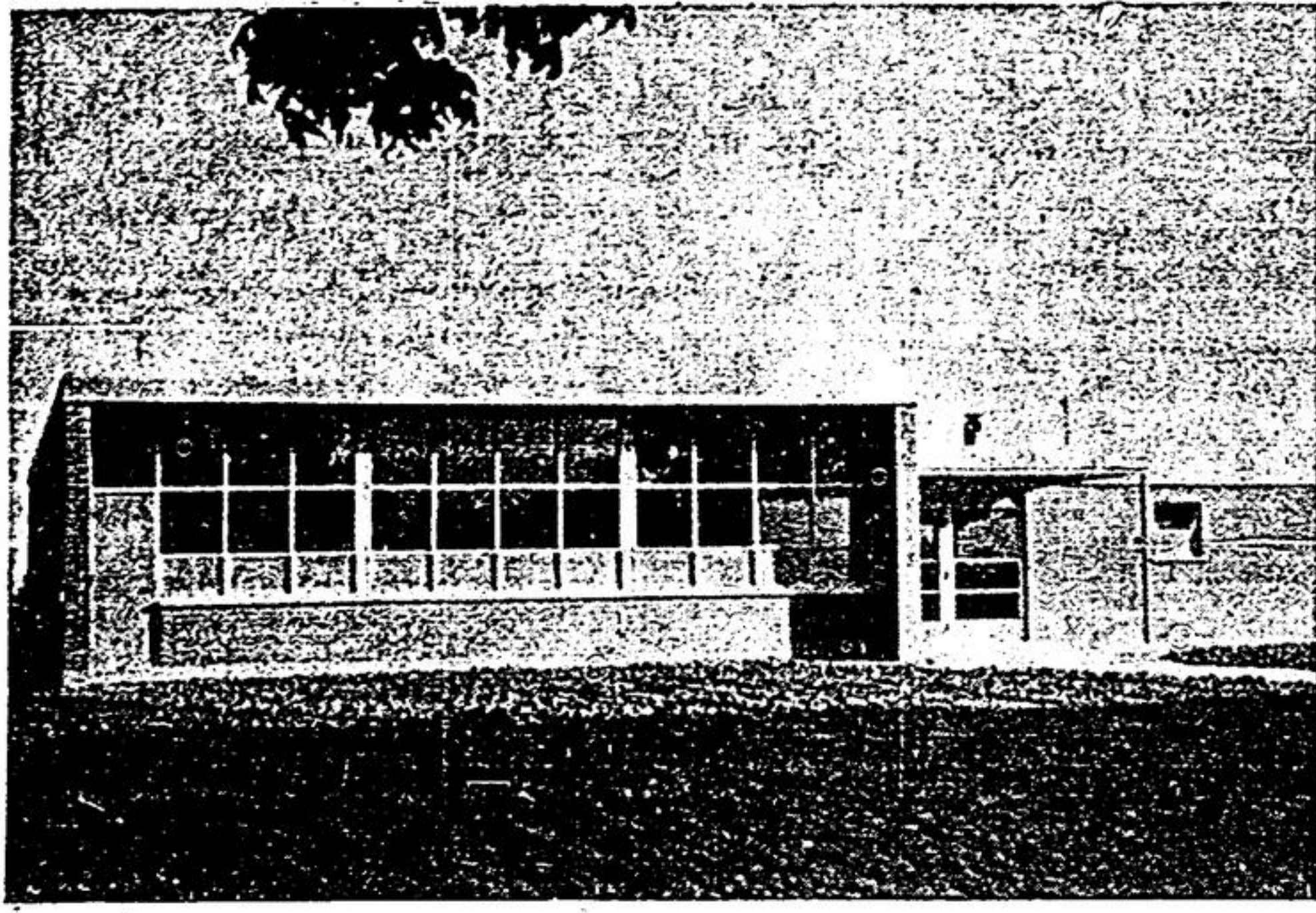


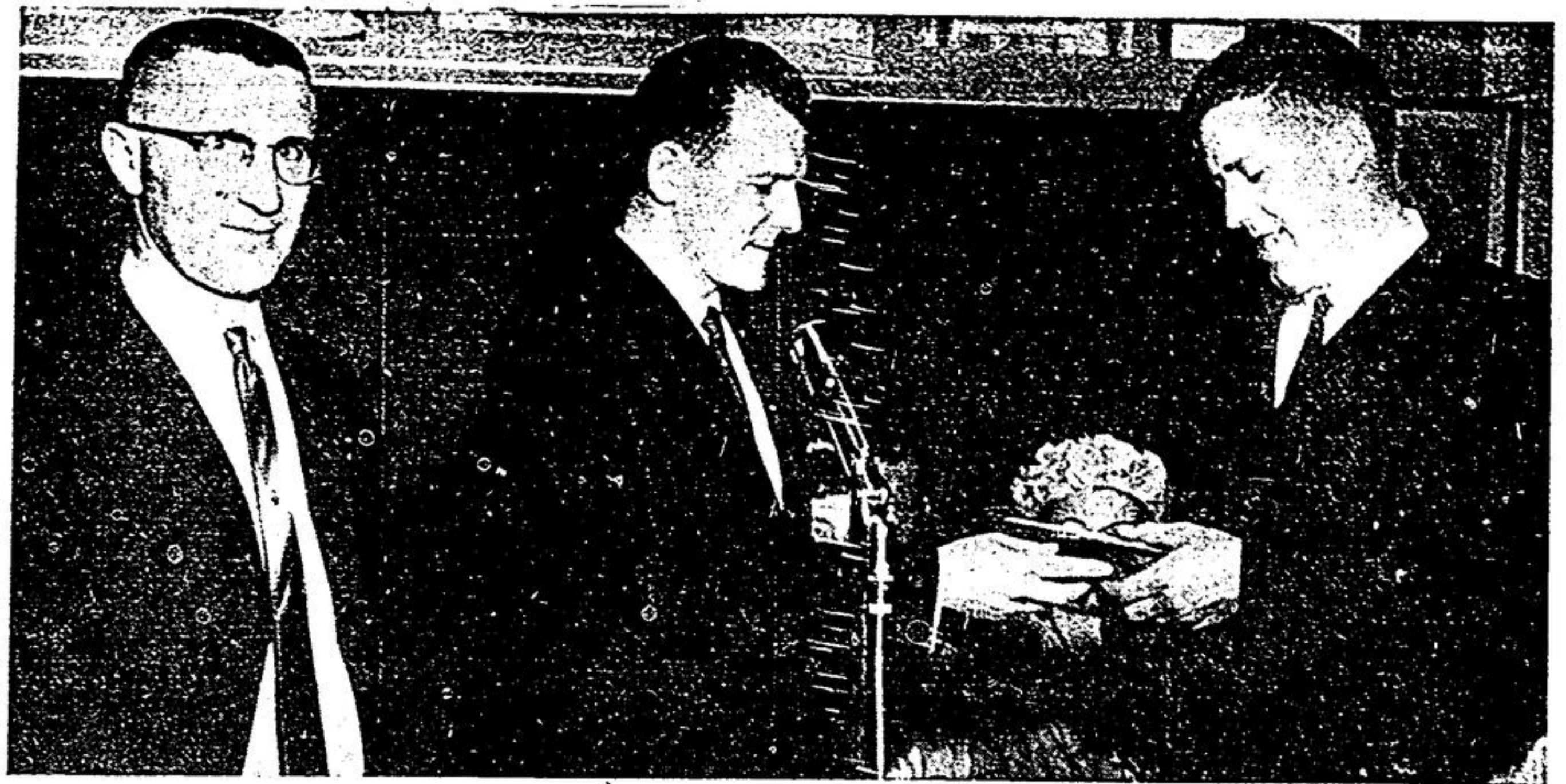
Open New Two-Room Glasgow Public School



On Friday evening, the new two-room Glasgow Public School, S.S. No. 6, Uxbridge Twp. was officially opened by Hon. M. B. Dymond, Minister of Health. The \$50,000 structure (left) replaces an old building that has been in use in the community for over 100 years.



Eleven year old Glenn Wideman, a grade 6 pupil, delivered the address of welcome. His remarks brought favourable comment from Dr. Dymond. The school choir presented three numbers, led by the Principal, Mrs. Vera Francis.

Aluminum Firm To Buy 17 Acre Site In Pickering

Plan To Erect 15000 Sq. Ft. Plant

Supreme Aluminum Industries Ltd. propose to erect a 15,000 square foot plant on a 17.6 acre site in the Township of Pickering and construction work is expected to begin almost immediately. The announcement, revealed by Reeve, Sherman Scott at a regular meeting of Council on Monday night was hailed as the initial step in a long sought industrial build-up within a defined area of the municipality.

The price of the land, owned by the township and located south of the Plitz property, was established at slightly less than \$3,000 per acre for a total of \$50,000.

With the completed purchase of ten acres by Ontario Hydro (\$30,000); Nordel Development Corp. Ltd., 3 acres (\$9,450); Sartok Industrial Development Ltd., 3 acres (\$9,450) and Supreme Aluminum Industries Ltd., 17.6 acres (\$50,000), the entire tract of township-owned industrial properties will be sold for a total price of \$98,000. The initial cost of purchase was \$81,000.

"sold out" of industrial land. "We will have to decide if we wish to purchase more property," he said. Councillor Milton Mowbray requested that he be permitted to abstain from any part of the discussion on the Supreme Aluminum land purchase since he was connected with the legal firm of Parkinson, Gardiner, Roberts who had been directly connected with the transaction. The request was granted by Council.

Oppose Wrecking Yard

A delegation of residents, supported by a 45 name petition, urged Pickering Twp. Council on Monday night to reverse any decision that would locate a wrecking yard on a site at the north half of lot 26, conc. 2. "It is a business of the lowest scale," said the spokesman for the group.

Reeve Sherman Scott pointed out that the business would provide a type of industrial assessment although he admitted that it was not the most desirable kind. He promised the ratepayers that the Council would not finalize the matter until the people in the area were notified of pending action.

A total of 73 contestants judged ten classes of livestock. The group visited the farms of Frank Batty & Son, Brooklin; Ken Holliday, Brooklin; Ransom Stock Farm, Oshawa, RR 3; and National Stud Farm, Oshawa, RR 1. Walter Beath, Oshawa, RR 2, provided two classes of purebred Suffolk ewes which were judged at the National Stud Farm.

DECISION BY COURT OF REVISION IS APPEALED

A Bay Ridges resident has issued an appeal against the recent decision handed down by the Pickering Twp. Court of Revision. The appeal, submitted by Mr. Vincent Webb, will be dealt with by a County Judge.

Earlier this year, the Pickering Revision Court decided that about 400 assessments should revert back to the 1961 level plus ten per cent.

The issue at that time included bulk farm land. Some residential taxpayers now feel that the bulk of the tax load will fall on their properties since hundreds of rural landowners have, in their opinion, been privileged.

The matter was not introduced for discussion at a regular meeting of Council on Monday night.
