
# Open New Two-Room Glasgow Public School



On Friday evening, the new two-room Glasgow Public School, S.S. No. 6, Uxbridge Twp. was officially opened by Hon, M. B. Dymond, Minister of Health. The \$50,000 structure (left) replaces an old building that has been in use in the community for over 100 years.





A Bay Ridges resident has issued an appeal against the recent decision handed down by the Pickering Twp. Court of Revision. The appeal, submitted by Mr. Vincent Webb, will be dealt with by a County Judge.

Earlier this year, the Pickering Revision Court decided that about 400 assessments should revert back to the 1961 level plus ten per cent.
