Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, that in accordance with the Weed Control Act, 1960, Ontario, Sections 3, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13, unless weeds growing on their lands within the Township of Whitchurch are cut or destroyed by Friday, July 5th, 1963, and throughout the season, the Weed Inspector of the Township of Whitchurch may enter upon said lands and have the weeds cut, charging the cost against the lands, as set out in the Act. The co-operation of all concerned is earnestly requested.

Asked to Re-consider Sale School Debentures

At the present time the total amount of school debentures issued by York County for the various municipalities, amounts to the staggering sum of \$4,232,113.00. It is understood that Vaughan Twp. will shortly apply to the county to issue an additional million dollar debenture for secondary schools in that township.

The Warden reported to county council last week that the future accumulation of debt charges may seriously affect the county's credit as well as the credit of local municipalities. In making this point the Warden recommended that council reconsider the policy of issuing debentures for high school construction.
