

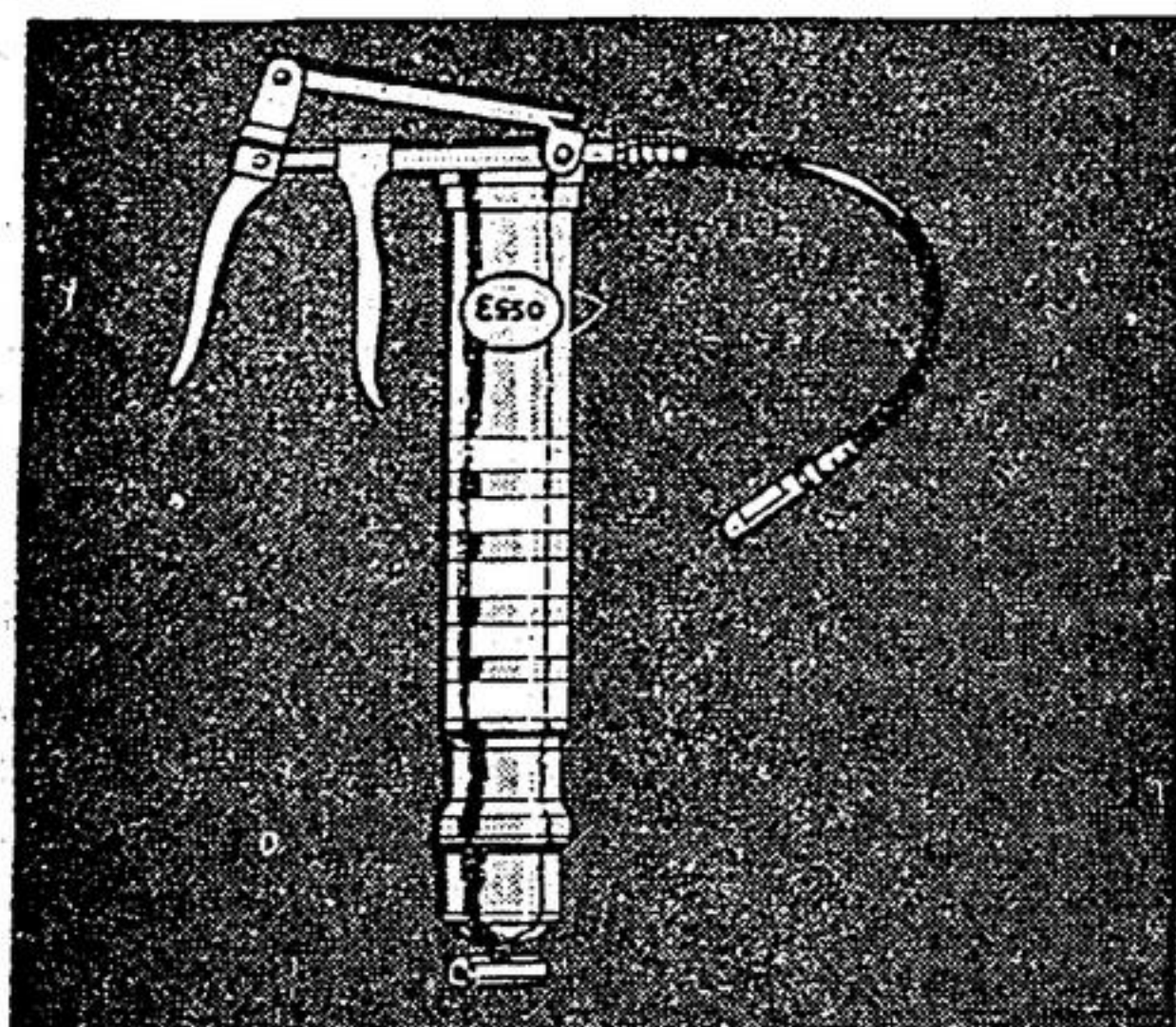

Bloomington Owes Name To Maxson Jones - 1869

Interesting things used to happen in Bloomington; they are all true, not just a good yarn. Boys are still as shy sometimes as that one, who at Sunday School entertainment when he was standing before his audience to say his little recitation, said to his mother, "Mother, if you let me face around the other way, I'll say it." Does anyone remember who that was?

In the 1890's brides did not announce their engagements as today, but wedding dates were kept as "awful big secrets." A certain bride, in preparing for marriage, made a wedding cake. When the cake was ready, it was a shocking discovery, that liniment had been used for flouring by mistake. A second cake was baked and put out to cool—and mysteriously disappeared. Nearby a building was being erected by several men, one of whom was Byron Jones. It is not exactly known, just what happened to this cake, but wouldn't it make a good lunch for the crew? Hastily a third cake was made, but it must have served its purpose, for we hear no more of that unlucky wedding cake.

Another mystery was, where did those delectable watermelons, grown by Cliff Lemon, disappear every fall? Perhaps even yet, someone could come up to answer this question.

One Halloween all the gates in Bloomington vanished overnight and could not be found. Weeks afterwards they were discovered in John Cleaver's cornfield, where they had been concealed in one of those long rows of corn shocks.

Don't tell us, that boys of these days are so much worse than those of the old days when in talking to our older citizens we learned, that the younger generation performed just as many and just as funny tricks as the youngsters of today. So let's not decide too hastily, that the "young fry are going to the dogs," just give them a chance to show what they can do. With a bit of guidance from Mother and Dad they will prove themselves leaders of tomorrow. Your former teachers still have faith in you, boys and girls, so let's see which of you will become our Prime Minister, or the leading lady of Rideau Hall!

Community Leaders
Every community has its leaders to whom it owes its development and progress. Bloomington owes its name to Maxson Jones, who registered it at about 1869. It is thought that the settlers might have brought the name from the United States, or as a more fanciful explanation, that it was called Bloomington because of the many beautiful young ladies blooming as flowers in the hamlet. Maxson Jones was born in the States and settled here in

the 1850's. He held just about every office in Municipal government from assessor to reeve of our township. He was also a notary public, postmaster and storekeeper, as mentioned before. He took a very active part in all community activities, as did Seneca Baker, who also became reeve and warden of York County. His sons, Morgan and Eugene, held public office, Morgan becoming Liberal M.P.P. for North York. Other men who have worked in offices in our township affairs, were Jesse Cook, Newton Rae, and Phillip Lemon.

We wonder, how many of the young generation will rise to these positions of responsibility in our township.

This has turned out to be a long story; may it help you to see the familiar houses and landmarks in your village with more depth in the background. You will be right in the foreground of this picture, and there is a great deal of space for you left to build and create in Bloomington. May all of you be "personally happy and publicly useful," as the saying goes, taking, perhaps, this simple verse as a guide:

Isn't it strange that princes and kings,
And clowns who caper in sawdust rings,
And common folk like you and me,
Are building for eternity?
To each is given a set of tools,
A shapeless mass and a book of rules,
And each must build ere life has flown,
A stumbling block or a stepping stone.

A number from here attended the Dedication Service in Meadowcrest Baptist Church on Sunday.

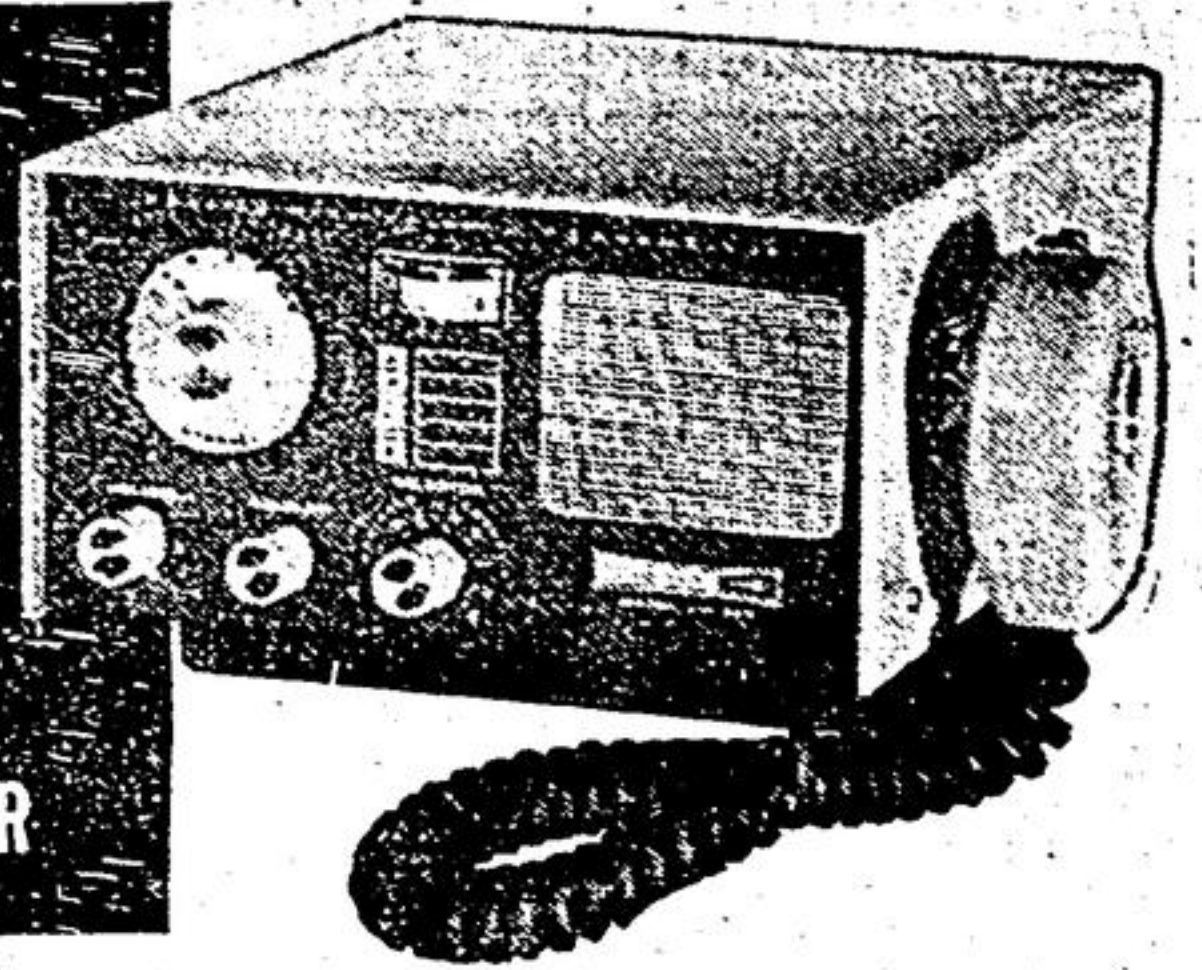
