Wasted Gasoline

Someone has estimated that the average driver wastes, just throws away uselessly, 34 gallons of gasoline a year, enough to keep a car on the road for a month or six weeks.



Studies over a number of years have shown that motorists are averaging 18 miles to the gallon when they should be getting 19. Bad driving habits are mainly to blame.

There are so many "rules for drivers" that one person can't possibly keep them all in his head. But these six rules come from the head of a big fleet of company cars; he found these rules cut their costs-per-mile way down and brought that extra month of free driving.

Don't make jackrabbit starts. Get away smoothly and shift into high gear as soon as possible.

Slow down gradually when you know you're going to have to stop. Your car runs on the power from gasoline already burned, so there's no sense wasting all that momentum by coming to quick stops.

Don't race your motor while waiting for lights to change or while warming up. Moderate speeds save gas and save the brakes. Don't ride the clutch or brakes. And finally, get regular checkups and servicing.

On The Farm Front...

(A. A. Wall, Agricultural Representative for York.)

The bulk of the hay crop has gone in this year in excellent condition. Many farmers have most of their crop put away with no rain damage at all. We haven't had bumper yields, but the hay will have high feed value next winter.

Good haying weather is a mixed blessing. It has slowed up pasture growth, and row crops are running short of moisture. A pasture shortage is always costly. We can't make it rain, but there are some things that can be done to head off short pasture.

An extra shot of fertilizer just after the hay comes off will help. Fields where the legumes have thinned out will respond best. Aftermath will come back better if there is lots of fertility. 200 to 300 lbs. of 8-16-16 or 10-10-10 is a good bet.

Feeding hay on pasture may seem a little foolish, because it costs money to make hay. But it also costs money to run out of pasture. If some hay feeding can give pasture fields a better chance to come back, it's a sound practice.

Pasturing oats can help too. Fields that have been seeded down in particular can be well used for pasture. Most of the new seedlings I have seen are in very good shape. But from here on they could very easily suffer from lack of moisture. The nurse crop takes a lot of moisture from now on, and small legume seedlings that look good now may be awfully weak at harvest time.

Oats can also be used for silage. Some of the corn crop was seeded late, and if dry weather continues, corn yields may be low. A field of oats put in the silo could be good insurance. For success it has to be cut just at the right time. Aim for the late milk or early dough stage, and wilting time will depend on weather. If the crop

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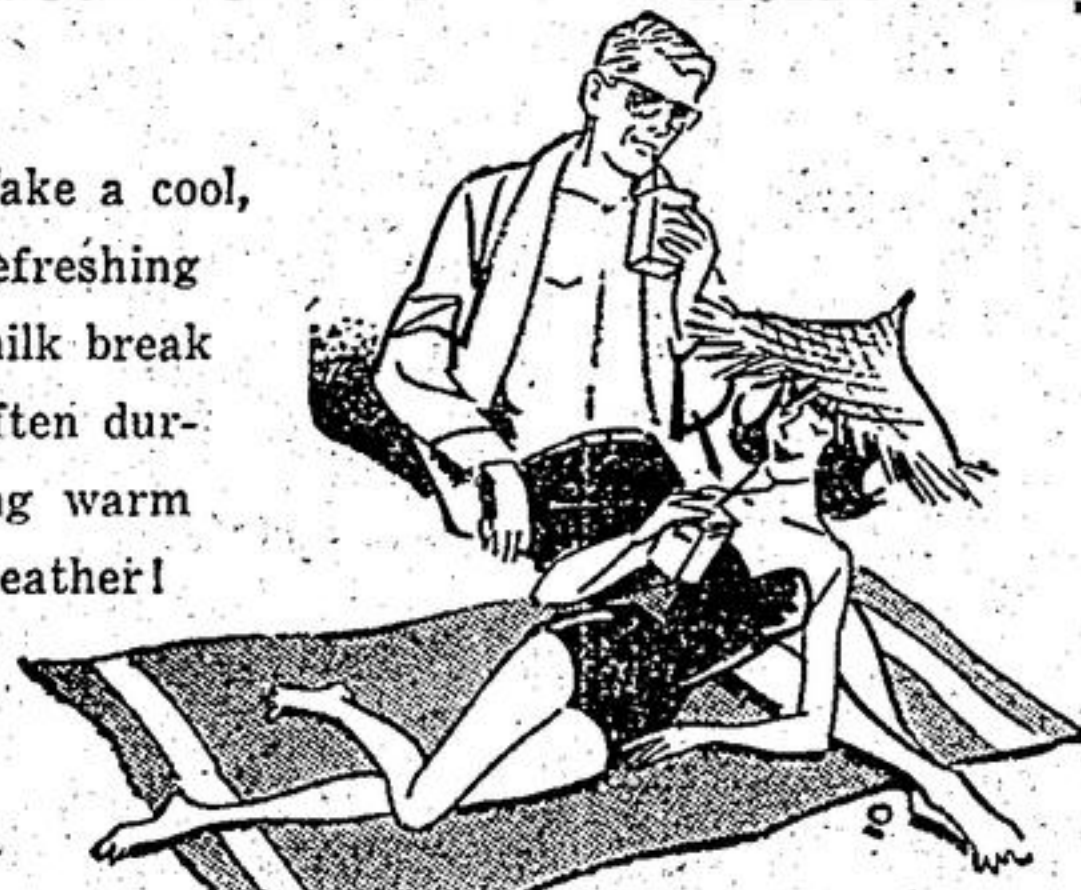
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
