# If Son Plans To Work Farm, May Build 1,150 Sq. Ft. House

## Less Than 50 At Meeting Presentations To Teachers At Webb School

The Planning Board and the council of the Twp. of Pickering are attempting to discourage the haphazard development of residential homes in the rural areas of the township. In an effort to maintain such a control, the first and second readings of a new zoning bylaw demands that houses in the country shall be 2,000 square feet in size, exclusive of the basement.

This stipulation aroused some criticism from an audience of less than fifty persons that attended a public meeting at Brougham on Thursday night.

The chairman of the Planning Board, Mr. Hardy Craig said that a two-story home of 1,000 square feet on each floor would fall within the requirements of the bylaw. He noted further that such a restriction did not refer to hamlets such as Green River, Brougham or the police village of Claremont.

Mr. Ray Percival of Project Planning Associates said that school costs in rural areas comprised a major per centage of an individual's tax payment and as long as such construction was permitted without restrictions, the school costs would continue to climb. He said that the cost of educating one child in public school for one year ranged from \$200 to \$250. He said that the taxes from a home in a non-serviced area with 150 square feet of floor space would amount to about \$180. He pointed out that as the size of the family grew, the load on the municipality climbed on a comparative basis.

"Son Is A Farmer"  
Mr. Percival was asked if a farmer could build a house on his property of 1,150 square feet for his son. In reply, the speaker explained that such a house could be erected if the son was assisting his father in the operation of the farm and would automatically succeed as the owner. He said, however, that permission would be denied if the son only wished to live on the premises but had employment else-

where. He stated further that if the farmer's son moved into the main residence, the parent would be permitted to build a new home on the property of 1,150 square feet.

The chairman, Mr. Craig explained that the Planning Board wished to hear all complaints prior to the bylaw's presentation to the council for a third reading. He said that all suggestions would receive fair consideration. Following a third reading, the bylaw will then be forwarded to the Ontario Municipal Board and a public hearing will be arranged at that time when all grievances will be aired once more. Seven members of the Township Planning Board were in attendance along with Reeve Sherman Scott and Councillors Milton McQuay and Hubert Wank.

\$40,000 Investment  
A representative of the Thos. Shea Real Estate of Markham charged that a residence of 2,000 square feet plus the lot would include an investment of possibly \$40,000. He said that his firm had done a rather large amount of business in the rural areas of Pickering and considered this demand to be too severe.

Mr. Craig argued that unfortunately, residential build-up of small homes in rural areas had not been counter-balanced by either industrial or commercial development which added up to one thing — high school taxes.

A clause in the bylaw stipulates that no gravel pit can be located within 200 feet of any existing dwelling or business and must be back 100 feet from any road.

Mr. Regan of the J. D. Regan Co., conc. 4 and 5 suggested that the plan should be altered to include another 50 acres on the 4th concession that was already operating as a gravel excavation. Mr. Regan was asked to present a detailed map of the property in question to the Planning Board and the matter would be considered.

## Nature Hike at Claremont - Greenwood

A series of conducted nature hikes will be held for the public in five conservation areas this coming weekend (July 6-7) by the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority.

Experienced Authority personnel will serve as guides on the hikes which will take about one hour to complete along the picturesque nature trails in the areas.

The first hikes are scheduled for Saturday at the Boyd conservation area near Woodbridge, at 2 p.m., 4 p.m. and 7 p.m.

On Sunday, hikes will take place at the following areas: Albion Hills, north of Bolton on #50 Highway, at 2 p.m.; Glen Haffy, 1 mile south of Mono Mills and #9 Highway at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m.; Greenwood, 4 miles north of Pickering Village on the Greenwood road, at 2 p.m. and Claremont area in Pickering Twp. 1 1/2 miles north of #7 Highway at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m.

There is no charge for the hikes, only the nominal 50-cent parking fee for cars.

and brought with it the threat of a major reconstruction program in the building industry this winter, which the \$500 rebate on winter-built homes was not enough to relieve.

The building materials tax, along with the tax on new industrial machinery, taken together, would have the effect of hitting at any one time the industry, right across the country.

The simple fact of the matter was that the building of new plants and the installation of new machinery in any program of expansion, could now be undertaken only upon payment of a heavy additional premium. And the premium of 11 percent was just enough to cause the shelving of any such plans until such time as the tax would be removed.

Here again the effect upon winter construction employment would make itself felt in a drastic way.

These were some of the considerations which were being brought home to the Government and its Budget advisers as the debate unfolded in the House of Commons.

The Budget may have been an economist's Budget — although even that is not certain. It is certainly not a businessman's Budget and not a workman's Budget.

Another measure, so far neglected in its implications, — but one which would have a great many headsache — is the measure related to a rebate for those who build homes in the period between December 1 and March 31.

The task of inspecting each and every home for which applications come in will be a monumental task and will mean that the Government will have to find an army of inspectors whose job will be to go across the country and make sure that all the applications which come in are in line with the requirements of the measure.

The problem of tying in the winter works program with the municipal loan fund has not been resolved. There have been discrepancies in statements from the Minister of Finance and the Minister of Labour on this subject, in reply to questions which I asked in the House.

These programs, to be effective, must work and in hand, and it is hoped for the sake of municipalities across Canada, who are now planning their programs, and for the sake of those who are counting on these programs for winter employment, that nothing will be allowed to interfere with the proper carrying out of the winter works program which has provided a great deal of employment in the past five years.

## Your M.P. Reports

The Budget fiasco — and it cannot be called anything but that — will be remembered for years as one of the most extraordinary performances by a Minister of Finance in Canada's parliamentary history.

The withdrawal of the 30 per cent tax on foreign stock sales one week after it was introduced is without parallel in the history of Federal Budget decisions.

The curious thing was that the criticism directed against this measure by the exchange people themselves charged that the measure indicated an abysmal ignorance of the way that stock transactions operate.

There was also the charge that the measure would have a disastrous effect on stock trading and might even wipe out the exchanges.

It was alleged that it would have the effect of drying up the sources of badly needed foreign capital. These charges were obviously so solidly based that it became necessary for the Government to recognize their validity and withdraw the measure.

The incomprehensible feature, of course, was that the measure was prepared under the aegis of a Minister of Finance whose familiarity with the market was taken for granted — and with the advice of persons whose

association with the market was intimate and continuing. This was one of the factors which lent an air of unreality to the whole proceeding.

The announcement of cancellation of the measure, coming as it did in the middle of the afternoon, was calculated to produce the inevitable chaos and confusion from which the market has not fully recovered.

This was only one aspect of a Budget which unfortunately bore the look of having been prepared in haste and without proper consideration of consequences.

For the rest, the Budget carried into effect some of the favourite theories of the Minister of Finance and his group of advisers, theories which had appeared in print in "Troubled Canada," Mr. Gordon's book, and which allegedly formed the cornerstone of the Government's fiscal and monetary policy.

One measure alone, and its withdrawal, is not enough to invalidate a Budget.

Nevertheless, the roar of criticism over the stock sales tax, poured equally vociferous and equally indignant criticism levelled at other measures almost equally controversial.

The tax on building materials drew heavy criticism from Builders' Exchanges across Canada.

## ENGAGEMENT REDSHAW-HILL
