First-baseman Bernie McGriskin led the Aces at the plate, whacking a single, a double, and a triple in four times at bat. In addition, he had four runs batted in and scored one run himself. Ken Beckett also had a big night, belting two singles and a double to drive himself, Morris Procenko (2), Ted Mathews, Jim Johnson, Rick Conlin and Bill Johnson counted the other Markham tallies. Bill Johnson's only hit of the game was a home-run with two of his mates on base in the sixth inning. The long fly ball caught left-fielder Rod Seiling by surprise and sailed far over his head.

Judd To Rescue Too Late To Save R. Hill From Loss To "Aces"

Markham "Aces" handed Richmond Hill (Dynes' Jewelers) their second defeat of the season last Wednesday night in a Metro Major Fastball League contest at Markham. The final score was 6-2.

The end result proved one thing; without the great Ray Judd on the mound the Richmond Hill team is nothing. The "Aces" pounded six hits and scored six runs off starter Brent Selvaige in the first two and two-third innings. Three men also reached first by walks in that short time. Judd, one of the best fastball pitchers in Ontario and no doubt the best to play in this area, hurled the last five and one-third innings striking out twelve batters while walking none. Markham could manage only two hits, both singles, off him.

Hurls 4-Hitter
"Lefty" Bob Ellis went the distance on the Markham mound and although he struck out only four batters and walked seven men he turned in a fine effort, limiting the opposition to only four hits. Two of these came in the fifth inning with the others in the first and eighth frames.

The Markham infield put on one of the finest displays seen here in some time. Second baseman Jim Johnson committed the "Aces" only error. They made up for this when they completed a great double play-out in the next play. The throw went from first baseman Bernie McGriskin to short-stop Al

Local Girls Edge Richmond Hill

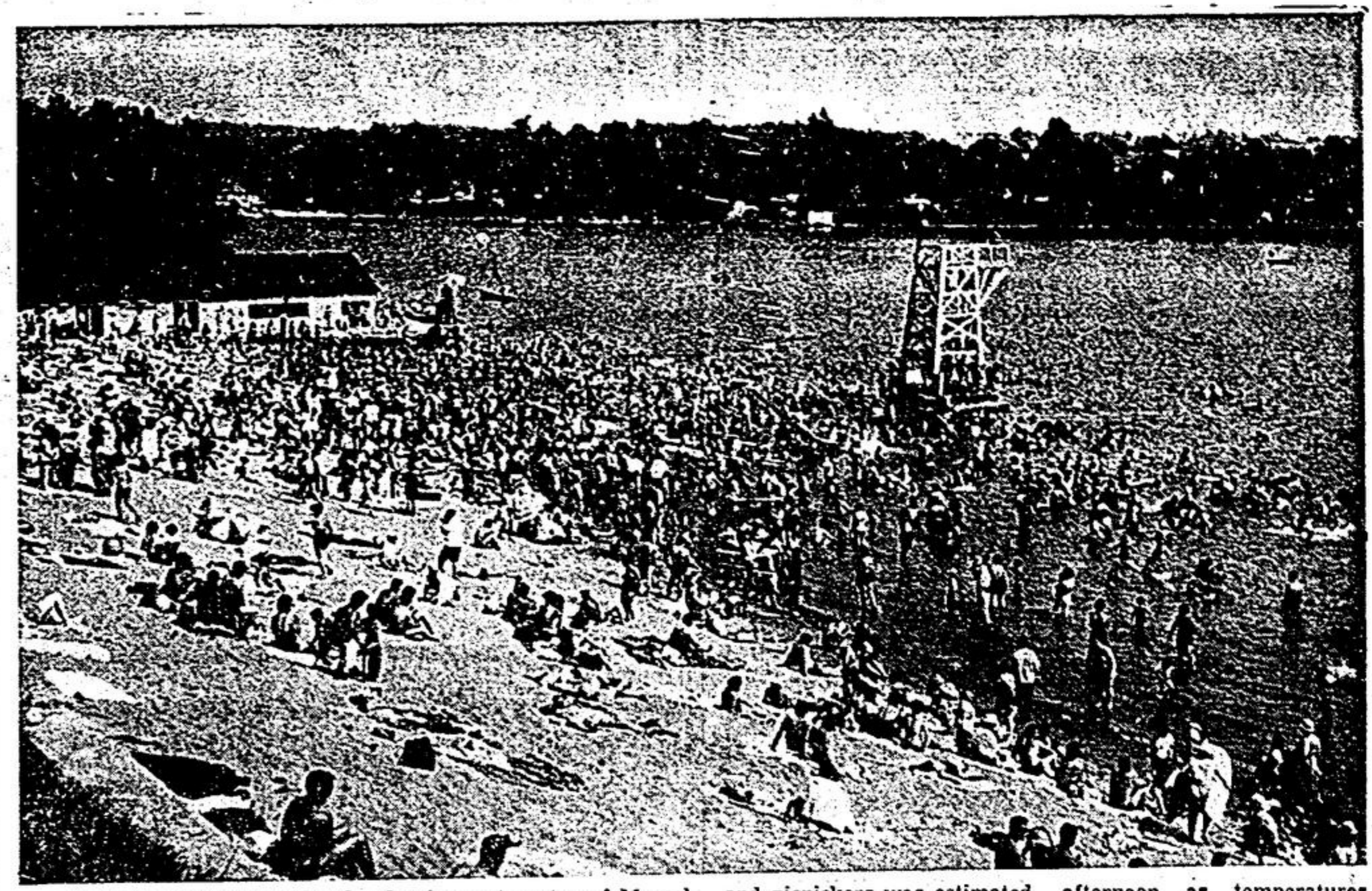
