The Ontario Safety League urges power mower owners to enjoy the full benefit of these work-saving machines by taking their accident potential seriously. Only so much safety can be built into a machine and the rest is up to the operator.

TOWNSHIP OF MARKHAM

By-law 2021 is published herewith for the information of all property owners and residents in the Township of Markham.

Township of Markham BY-LAW NUMBER 2021

A by-law to prohibit the use of any land within a defined area of the municipality for dumping or disposing of domestic or industrial waste.

1. The following area of the Township of Markham is hereby defined as an area to which the provisions of this by-law shall apply, namely:

The whole of the Township of Markham save and except the east half of the west half of Township Lot 35 and the west half of the east half of Lot 35, Concession 5.

2. For the purpose of this by-law industrial waste shall mean:

- (a) Material of any kind which has been obtained from an incinerator;
- (b) Any material obtained from an abattoir as a waste product;
- (c) Any material obtained from an abattoir for the purpose of dumping or disposing of such material as waste, refuse or garbage.

3. For the purpose of this by-law domestic waste shall mean any waste material obtained for disposal elsewhere than on the premises from which such waste has been obtained.

4. The dumping or disposing of domestic or industrial waste as hereinbefore defined in the said defined area is hereby prohibited.

5. Any person convicted of any breach of the provisions of this by-law shall forfeit and pay in the discretion of the convicting magistrate a penalty not exceeding (exclusive of costs) the sum of \$300.00 for each offence recoverable under the Summary Convictions Act.
