Dunec Leads Stouffville To Win Over Vic. Square

Stouffville's second baseman Pete Dunec continues to lead his team in the batting department. On Tuesday night at Claremont he clouted two singles and a triple and scored two runs to lead his team to an 8-5 win over Victoria Square.

Both teams were scoreless until the third inning. Bill Sheridan and George Neal were walked. Sheridan scored on Jim Hall's single and Neal and Hall came home on an error by Victoria Square catcher Dave Iversen. Victoria Square crossed the plate on the third, Fred Roman crossing the plate on an error by Larry Spang. Roman had got on base with a double into centre field. Victoria Square took the lead in the fifth frame, scoring four runs. Wayne Morrison belted a home run and Bill Munroe a double. Munroe crossed the plate on an error. Keith McDowell took over the Stouffville mound chores at this point. John Rumble reached first by an error and McDowell walked Allan Brown. Dave Iversen drove both men home with a double. In the sixth inning Bruce Fockler clouted a double to push Pete Dunec across the plate. Fockler romped home on a wild pitch. Keith McDowell and Bill Sheridan also scored in that inning. Dunec counted once more in the seventh for the winners.

The throw went from short-stop Fockler to Pete Dunec at second to first baseman Larry Spang.

Both John Rumble and right-fielder Bill Munroe made great catches for Victoria Square. First baseman Allan Brown also turned in a fine effort. Stouffville made five errors and the losers committed only two. Each team left five men stranded.

The win gave Stouffville a total of fourteen points leaving them in a tie for sixth place in the league standings. Victoria Square is the tenth place team in the loop. To date they have amassed a total of three points in fourteen contests. Oddly enough their only win was over the third place Greenwood Jr. squad. They tied one game for their other point.

Bruce Fockler Powers Team To 11-7 Win

Paced by Bruce Fockler's three hit barrage on Thursday night, Stouffville posted an 11-7 victory over Brock Road in a Community Softball encounter under the lights in the Memorial Park. The local shortstop whacked out two singles and a double in four trips and slammed another well-tagged ball to deep centre field in the 4th but it was nabbed for the out. At his infield "hot spot", he was the pivot performer on a double play in the 3rd that nipped pitcher Ron Hensen at second and Jack Bradshaw at 1st.

Brock Road equalled Stouffville in the hit department but they committed a total of 8 errors. Ron Hensen worked the 9th inning distance on the mound for the visitors. Gord Tarr toiled 8 innings on the Stouffville hill with Keith McDowell taking over in the ninth.

Brock Road catcher Hugh Pugh enjoyed a good night at the plate with three single-base blows. Second baseman Gary Mitchell slammed a home run in the 4th.

Geo. Neal and Gord Tarr each poked out a pair of safeties for Stouffville. Both of Tarr's drives were doubles.

Stouffville To Have Junior Entry In O.B.A.

Stouffville will file a Junior entry this season in the Ontario Baseball Association playoffs. They will be classed in "B" division.

The club will be coached by Don Haynes. The manager is Geo. McKay. Approval of all player personnel has been received from O.B.A. officials.

Clodd Top Batter

Bob Clodd was the leading batter for Brougham. He belted a triple and two singles and was walked twice in five frames at bat. Catcher Bill Elliott collected four singles in five trips to the plate. Howard Malcolm clouted a double and a single. Stu McGuckin and Al Johnson each collected two singles. First baseman Don Drake blasted a two-run homer in the sixth inning.

Clodd scored four runs and Malcolm and Elliott each counted three times. McGuckin, Johnson, Drake, Paul White and Bill Payne crossed the plate for Brougham's other tallies.

Wayne Morrison had a good game at the plate for the losers. He whacked a bases-empty home-run and a triple in three frames at bat. Bill Munroe belted two doubles, Dave Iversen two singles, and Al Brown one safety for Victoria Square. Morrison (2), Munroe, and Dave Rumble scored their only runs.

Victoria Square committed six errors. Brougham made only one. Each team left seven men stranded on base.

Centre-fielder Robert Loudon and second-baseman John Rumble each made two great catches, taking sure hits off the bats of Keith Puckrin and Al Johnson. Bill Payne turned in a good game for Brougham taking the place of regular short-stop Ron Hearst.

Goodwood Team Belts Four Homers; Edge Brock Rd. 11-10

Ron May Top Batter

The last time Goodwood and Brock Road tangled in a Claremont Community League game Goodwood came out on the short end of a 2-1 score, getting only two hits in seven innings. On Tuesday night at Claremont the "Mercury's" downed their opposition 11-10 in a seven-inning contest that saw two Brock Road pitchers clipped for eleven hits, including four home-runs.

Centre-fielder Ron May led the winners at the plate blasting two homers in addition to a single in four frames at bat. Both of his four-baggers came with one man on base and each was a drive into right-field. His second was one of the longest hit balls seen in the Claremont Park this year. Ken May belted a homer off relief hurler Ron Henson in the fifth inning with one on base. Catcher Bob Todd hit a circuit-clout in the first frame with one man on. Ken Davis whacked a long fly ball into centre field in the seventh but was thrown out at home trying to stretch the triple into a homer. Roger Forsythe (2), Davis (2), Dave Jackson (2), and Ken May counted the winner's other runs.

Goodwood committed five errors while Brock Road made only two. Neither team completed any exceptionally good plays. Brock Road left eight men on base while the winners marooned two.

One Player Ejected

Brock Road second-baseman Bob Boyd was put out of the game in the seventh inning by plate official Gord Todd when he argued about an out call the umpire had made. He had been warned in the sixth frame when he took exception to another call. In the second inning Goodwood pitcher Ken May was threatened with expulsion after he spiked Bob Hunter on a play at first base. When Bob Todd questioned the warning he too was told he would be "thrown out" if he continued the argument.

Todd was stunned in the fourth inning when he was hit on his face mask by a foul tip off the bat of Ernest Brown. Later in the game he injured his finger when hit by another foul ball but he stayed in the game.

About forty people watched the contest. Cliff Dunkeld was the base umpire.

Markham Aces Lose 2-0 To Robertshaws

New Toronto Robertshaws defeated Markham Aces 2-0 in a Metro Major Fastball League game at Morgan Park last Wednesday night. The Aces won the first game of the home and home series two nights earlier by a score of 5-7.

In the nine inning contest Markham could manage only four hits off righthander George Dvernechuk. He struck out six men and did not walk any. "Lefty" Bob Ellis went the distance for the Aces. He was touched for eight hits, all singles. He had his drop ball working to perfection as he struck out thirteen batters. Bob Alexander, who hit a home-run off Markham Monday night, struck out five times in five trips to the plate. Ellis walked one man.

In the first inning George Teasdale hit a single for Robertshaws but was put out at second on the next play. In the second frame Gary Dempster belted a single into centre field and Tom O'Gorman followed him with a fly. George Dvernechuk reacted first on a well-placed bunt. With two out and the bases loaded, Gary McCormick came to bat. Lefty Ellis struck him out but catcher Tidbury let the third strike get away from him and Dempster scored, with McCormick safe at first. The next batter hit a scorching drive which second-baseman Jim Johnson fumbled, then recovered in time for the out, leaving the bases loaded.

Ellis hurled no-hit ball for the next three innings but was clipped for three safeties in the sixth frame. Gary Dempster reached first on an error to short-stop Jackie Robinson and was moved to third base on Bill Morse's single. Pitcher Dvernechuk hit home with a single base hit into centre field. Teasdale got a bunt single but the next two batters were put out leaving the bases loaded again. Wayne Gordaneer singled in the seventh inning but could not get past second.

Collect Only 4 Hits

The "Aces" collected only four hits in the entire game. The Johnson brothers, Jim and Bill, led the team. In the first inning they each hit singles. Jim also collected a safety in the sixth. In the bottom of the ninth frame Ken Beckett came in as a pinch-hitter for Al Tidbury and promptly whacked out a single to right field. He was nipped at second on the next play however. Bill Johnson had two stolen bases to his credit. Johnson and Jackie Robinson each got on base by errors but both were left stranded. Robertshaws marooned ten men.

Centre-fielder Wayne Gordaneer played a great game for the winners. He made a sensational grab of a hit off the bat of Bernie McGriskin in the second inning. The long fly ball had

home-run written all over it and Gordaneer's catch seemed to take all the fire out of the Aces. Gary McCormick at first base also made a good play in the same inning. He fumbled Harry Young's drive and dove after it keeping his foot on the bag for the out. Bill Johnson came again was the "Aces" best in the fielding department. He made at least two fine catches of pop-up flies.

Markham centre-fielder Harry Young and base umpire Gord Coverley almost came to blows in the second inning over a disputed call at first base. Loring Doolittle was the plate official.

About three hundred fans watched the contest.
