

Arena Company Shows Profit Of \$7,668 For 1962-63; Gar Lehman New President

The Stouffville Arena Ltd. enjoyed an excellent winter season according to the financial report for 1962-63 presented to shareholders at the annual meeting held on Thursday night. Net profits for the year totalled \$7,668.62. In addition, the company has a reserve investment of \$32,000. Eighteen persons were in attendance.

The Board has agreed that a dividend of \$6.00 per share should be paid, the first such return since the rink's erection in 1949.

Large Return

The big money-maker for the firm was in ice rental that totalled \$22,409.09, an increase of over \$2,000 from last year. Public skating was also up nearly \$200 and totalled \$3,112.55. The skate grinder brought in \$998.75. The profit from the refreshment booth was \$7,333.83.

On the expense side of the ledger, wages exceeded \$13,000. For the service of heat, light and water, the arena paid out over \$4,000. Insurance was \$1,800.00 with maintenance and repairs, \$1,100.00.

Gar Lehman was elected President of the Company for 1963-64, succeeding Elmer Daniels to the post. The executive will include — Ken Laushway, Les Wilson, Ken Roberts, Elmer Daniels, Erle Lehman and Wm. Parsons. Mr. Parsons will continue in the office of Secretary-Treasurer. The Manager is W. T. Rennie.

Some repair work will be done on the roof prior to the winter season and the cost is not expected to exceed \$1,000. Two new fans will be installed at a cost of \$250 each. Further consideration will be given to acquiring gas heaters, similar to the units in use in the Aurora rink. It was thought that six would be sufficient at \$250 apiece.

Mr. Walt Todd, a representative of the Stouffville Lions Club, spoke on behalf of the service organization. He said that approximately \$4,000 had been spent last winter for hockey ice time, the promotion of which, tended to increase the business at the refreshment booth. He said that the Club was prepared to renew the contract for '63-64.

Following the adjournment of the meeting, the directors met to draw up plans for the new season.

Ted Matthews Fires 2-Hitter, Hits Two Singles As Aces Win

Lefthander Ted Matthews fired a sizzling two-hit ball game as Markham "Aces" defeated Aurora 5-0 in a Metro Major Fastball League game at Markham. In addition to his fine mound performance, Matthews tapped out two singles in three trips to the plate.

In the nine inning tilt Matthews struck out ten batters and gave up four bases on balls. He allowed one hit in each of the first two innings and pitched a hitless ball for the last seven. He appeared to tire in the later stages of the game and walked two men in the seventh frame and another in the 8th but each time the runners were left on base. The Aurora team was retired in order in the first, third, fifth and sixth innings.

Gary Nolan went the distance on the Aurora hill to take the loss. He was touched for five hits in eight innings while chalking up ten strike-outs and walking two batters. He retired the side in order in the second, third, fifth and sixth frames.

Four Stolen Bases

In the first inning Rich Conlin reached first on an error. Then Jackie Robinson singled, moving Conlin to second. Bill Johnson hit the ball to first baseman Earl MacDonald who threw wild to third, allowing Conlin and Robinson to romp home. Owen McKrickard belted

a double to drive Johnson across the plate.

The "Aces" added two more tallies in the eighth frame. Conlin reached first on a fielder's choice, Ted Matthews being put out at second. Bill Johnson followed with a bunt that catcher Hill threw to second base. Ron Crouch dropped the ball leaving both runners safe. Then the fun began and when the dust had cleared, one run had been scored on four "stolen" bases.

First Rich Conlin stole third. When the throw went to third base, Johnson stole second. Third baseman Ron Beckett threw to second to try and put out the runner and Conlin came home. When the ball was tossed to the plate Johnson stole third, and scored on a wild pitch to batter Bill Johnson. Bill belted a double into rightfield but was stranded on base.

For Aurora, Don McKnight and Ron Beckett each hit singles but neither could advance farther than second.

Four Double Plays

Markham played errorless ball while the losers made three errors, to allow two runs.

A double play is something that is not seen too often, and it is a rarity when more than one is completed in one game. On Wednesday night no less than four such plays were made, two by each team.

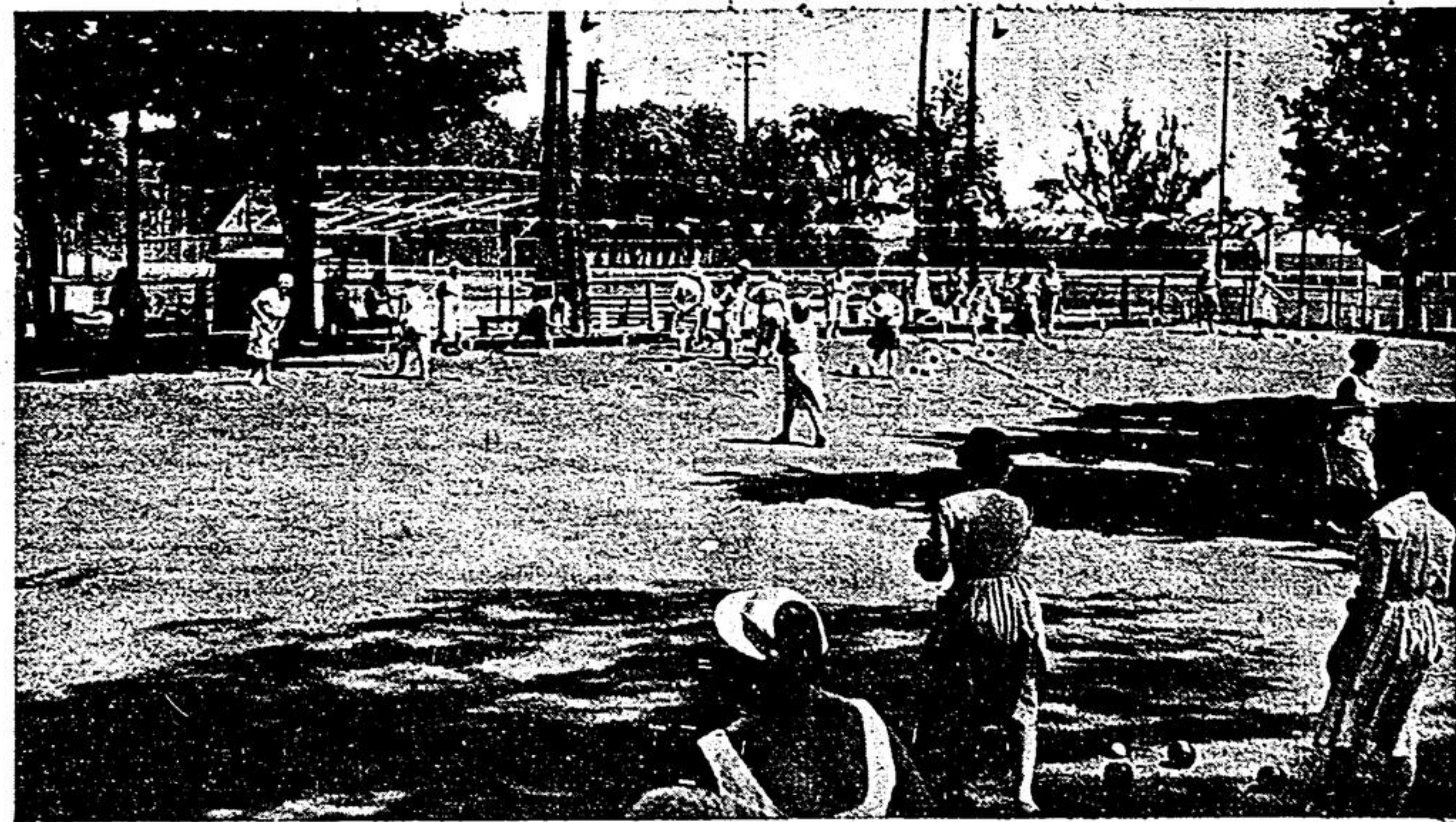

Errors Costly

Claremont scored six runs on Stouffville errors in the seven inning contest. First baseman Larry Spang committed three before left-fielder George Neale replaced him.

Claremont counted two runs on an error in the first frame. They added five more in the second, three of them unearned. In the third frame they tallied once and pushed six men across the plate in the fourth inning on five hits before Gord Tarr took 'er in the Stouffville mound.
