The Leader of the Opposition Rt. Hon. John Diefenbaker, is responding to the introduction of this Canadian Pension Plan Resolution, demanded that the Government separate its proposal of a \$10. a month increase in Old Age Pensions from its plan to institute a contributory portable pension plan.

.Mr. Diefenbaker's argument was that separation of the two schemes would enable present pensioners to start receiving at the higher rate; of \$75. a month immediately.

This was turned down by the Government as they are planning to dip into the contributions made by employers, employees, and private individ-uals who will be making these contributions to the pension plan, and to use this money to increase the pensions of present recipients from \$65. to \$75. They cannot do this until the fund has been built up. It has been stated that the contributions will start sometime in October, 1964.

The report of Justice T.G. Norris on the disruption of shipping on the Great Lakes is now in the lap of the Government and they are pondering as to what to do with the recommendations made by the
