NATURE HIKES IN CONSERV. AREAS

A series of conducted nature hikes will be held for the public in five conservation areas this coming weekend (Aug. 17-18) by the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority.

Experienced Authority personnel will serve as guides on the hikes, each of which takes about an hour to complete, along the picturesque nature trails in the areas.

On Saturday, the hikes are scheduled for the Boyd conservation area near Woodbridge at 2 p.m., 4 p.m. and 7 p.m.; Greenwood area 4 miles north of Pickering Village, at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. and at Claremont area in Pickering Township, 1½ miles north of #7 highway, at 4 p.m.

On Sunday, the hikes will take place at the following areas: Albion Hills at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m.; Glen Haffy, 1 mile south of Mono Mills and #7 highway, at 4 p.m.; Claremont area, at 4 p.m., and at the Greenwood area at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m.

There is no charge for the hikes, only the nominal 50-cent parking fee for cars.
