**Few Changes In '63 Pheasant Shoot**

Prospects for this fall's pheasant season throughout the province seem relatively good, the department of lands and forests has announced. Ontario and neighbouring U.S. states did not have any large winter mortality of pheasants, despite heavy snowfall in many pheasant production areas.

An early spring has led biologists to be optimistic about this year's production which was higher in 1962 after a decline throughout much of the area in 1960.

There has been a reduction in the number of varieties of seasons throughout southern Ontario, and this is expected to provide larger blocks of pheasant range to give a wider distribution of hunters over a larger area.

The season locally for pheasants will be October 26 to November 2.

Few changes have been made from the season in 1962. In Essex county and Romney Township, Raleigh and Harwich townships in Kent County, the season will be October 26 to November 2.

Pelee Island season will be announced later in the year.

In Lincoln and Welland counties and the townships of Ancaster, Barton, Saltfleet, Gamford and Binbrook in Wentworth County, the season also opens on October 26 but extends to November 9.

Throughout the general southwestern Ontario pheasant range including the remainder of Kent and Wentworth counties as well as all of the counties of Lambton, Middlesex, Elgin, Oxford, Norfolk, Perth, Wellington, Waterloo, Brant, Haldimand, Dufferin, Halton, Peel, York; and the townships of Hay, Stephen and Usborne in Huron county; and in the townships of Toronto, Essa, Innisfil, Adjala, Tecumseth, West Gwillimbury in Simcoe county, and the townships of Scott, Uxbridge, Pickering, Reach, Whitby and East Whitby in Ontario county, the season will be similar to last years on October 16 and extending to November 2.

In Clarke and Darlington townships of Durham county, the season will again be October 5 to October 26.

In the rest of Ontario (including Bruce and Grey counties), the season will be from October 5 to November 2.

In areas where the season begins on October 5, the bag will be three birds of any sex per day.

In the rest of the province where the season opens on October 16 or October 26 the bag will be two cocks and one hen per day.

Ptarmigan, Ruffed Grouse, Spruce Grouse, Sharp-tailed Grouse

The seasons and bag limits are similar to those held in 1962 except for some boundary modifications in the Sault Ste. Marie, Sudbury and North Bay districts.

In the area north of Highway No. 17 from Mattawa to Spragge and north of a line between Spragge to the International Boundary north of Cockburn Island in the North Channel, the season on all four species opens on September 14. It closes on December 14 throughout this area for all four species except that in the territorial districts of Cochrane, Temiskaming and that part of the Kenora District north of the 11th base line, the season on sharp-tails and ptarmigan will continue to March 31. This longer season for ptarmigan and sharp-tails established in 1962 allows residents of the area to take advantage of peak populations of migrant sharp-tails whenever they are abundant without a special season being declared.

In the area west of the western boundaries of Simcoe and Peel counties and in Clarke and Darlington townships and Durham county the season on the four species will be from October 5 to December 14.

In the rest of the Ontario (south-eastern Ontario), the season will be September 21 to December 14.

The bag limits which are the same as in 1962 will allow the taking of 5 ruffed or spruce grouse in the aggregate per day and the possession of 15 in aggregate; 5 sharp-tails per day and possession of 15; and 5 ptarmigan per day and possession of 15.

**Approve Recommendations Of Fed. of Agriculture**

Several recommendations put forward by the Ontario Federation of Agriculture have received the approval of the Provincial Farm Machinery Investigation Committee, a body that was formed following the 1961 annual meeting of the O.F.A.

The following requests were put forward - (1) That adequate research be done into new types of equipment plus rigorous field testing under Ontario conditions before offering machines for sale. (2) That a minimum full warranty period of one year be placed on all machines. (3) Standardization of parts so they can be interchangeable between machines. (4) That repair parts be available on Saturdays and holidays during busy seasons. (5) That replacement parts be made readily available for a minimum period of ten years from the date of purchase of any machine. (6) That dealers be required to prove the suitability of machinery by providing an adequate demonstration on the farmer's own land.

Mr. H. K. Musgrave, President of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture has welcomed the announcement made recently by Hon. Wm. A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture, of the government's intention to establish a Farm Machinery Board. This announcement coincides with the publication of the Report of the Ontario Farm Machinery Investigation Committee which recommended the establishment of such a Board.

The O.F.A. has complimented the Investigation Committee on the excellence of its report. Appreciation has also been voiced on the prompt action of the Minister of Agriculture in preparing to implement the recommendations of the Committee.

The Ontario Federation of Agriculture reports that conditions still exist where farmers are unable to procure replacement parts, even for new model machines of leading manufacturers, without experiencing disastrous delays. The O.F.A. feels that such hold-ups, although criticized by the Investigation Committee, indicate that some form of legislation will be required before the Farm Machinery Board can operate effectively.

**Record Number of People Visit Pioneer Village**  
Last week's attendance of 10,000 visitors set a record at the Pioneer Village.

The National Youth Orchestra recently visited the village. The 92 top musical students were on a national tour and on one of the rare breaks in their workshop, took a day off and visited the village.

A puppet show will be one of the main attractions at the Pioneer Festival, September 28, as well as a spelling contest, parades, etc., and tours through the 15 restored pioneer buildings. Two new buildings, a boot and shoemaker's shop and a saddlery and harness shop are open to the public this year.

The matched yoke of oxen has been a great attraction all summer. Efforts are being made to have them appear at the International Ploughing Match this fall, but to date the Pioneer Village officials have not yet consented.

Another attraction will be the lacrosse match, another first at the festival, a game which originated among the Indians of North America and has been steadily gaining in popularity. In 1967 the National Lacrosse Association of Canada will be observing its centenary.

The Bolton Community Choir will also perform at the festival this year.
