# Editor's Mail

The Editor,  
Stouffville Tribune.

Dear Sir:

The average cost of Hydro in Stouffville in 1962 for industrial use was 2.26¢ per kilowatt hour. In Richmond Hill it was 1.31¢ (almost one-half). In Markham it was 1.75¢ and in Uxbridge it was 1.78¢.

This is one reason that industry, when surveying various locations to set up manufacturing plants, have passed up Stouffville for other places. Hydro rates are one of the deciding factors in costs of some types of manufacturing.

Also, the commercial rate in Stouffville is 1.96¢ (kwhr. (2c)), in Richmond Hill it is 1.19¢; Markham 1.51¢; Uxbridge 1.52¢. These last 3 about 1 1/2¢ per kwhr.

The Residential rate in Stouffville is 1.22¢ (kwhr); Uxbridge 1.02¢; Markham 1.28¢; Richmond Hill 1.27¢.

These figures are averages and are taken from the 1962 Annual Report of the Ontario Hydro.

(A kilowatt hour (kwhr.) is the amount of current used, for example, in burning 10-100 watt bulbs for one hour.)

In comparison with 1960, the Residential rate in Stouffville increased from 1.28¢ to 1.32¢, the Commercial rate increased from 1.83¢ to 1.96¢ and the Industrial rate from 2.01¢ to 2.26¢.

At the same time the Industrial rate in Markham decreased from 1.97¢ to 1.75¢; Richmond Hill from 1.61¢ to 1.31¢; Uxbridge from 1.81¢ to 1.78¢; Aurora from 1.15¢ to 1.13¢. Almost all the other rates for Residential, Commercial and Industrial decreased during that period of time in these communities.

There may be a good reason why rates here are so high, but until they are more competitive with other places nearby there is not too much hope of attracting industries to set up plants here.
