

MUST SAVE FOR NEW CAPITAL SAYS ADDISON

Only way for Canadians to develop sufficient capital to become owners in their own economy is by saving. Mr. John Addison, local Member of Parliament told the Stouffville Lions Club on Monday night. Mr. Addison told the Lions that at the present time, Canadian industry was 60% foreign-owned. In forty to fifty years we may be able to reduce this figure to possibly 25% if we work on the problem.

He said he was not adverse to some foreign investment but he continued, we must always be a good partner, never a tricky trader.

Much of the erosion of Canadian-owned industry has taken place since the war, he said. Two hundred and fifty companies have been bought out since that time. "I can't hope to buy these back," he said, "we simply haven't got the money."

Mr. Addison said there were two choices open to help rectify the situation. "If we reduce the flow of capital into the country, we'll slow down growth; the other way is to increase our saving."

He admitted that present tax laws were detrimental; they take 23.1% in relation to the gross national debt.

In the conclusion Mr. Addison said the big controversy was whether or not some day we will become part of the United States. "If you or I as a private citizen see a greater economic future in the U.S. we can go there. If the nation as a whole sees a greater economic future it could do the same."

Mr. Addison was introduced to the gathering by Mr. David Coon who is a member of the Victoria Square Lions Club, and a vote of appreciation was expressed through Lion Ted Topping.
