Pickering Blood Donor Clinic November 11th

One practical way to honour the Red Cross Centenary which is being observed this year, would be to support the Blood Donors Clinic which is being conducted by the Pickering Township and Village Branch on Monday, November 11th, at the United Church C. E. Centre, Pickering. THE NEED IS URGENT.

Scheduled operations recently had to be postponed for lack of blood in the blood bank. In spite of a generous response to emergency calls the need for blood is constant and never ceasing. Last May, thanks to our public's response, a record Clinic was held in Pickering and an appeal for rare types of blood required particularly at that time was met. But a new record is needed this time, and the Branch is taking this opportunity to call on all previous donors to give again, and to try and persuade a friend to give as well.

Through friends' generosity, all donors will be eligible for a Lucky Door Prize, which will be drawn for at the end of the

clinic. Blood Clinic Hours will be 2:00-4:30 and 6:30-9:00 p.m. on November 11th, this being Remembrance Day. A most suitable way to observe it would be to give blood to save lives. Liquor Licence Approved For Proposed Motor Motel In Pickering Township

Mrs. Jean Choquette, promoter of a proposed motor-motel in Kinsale, informed a regular meeting of Pickering Twp. Council on Monday night that her request for a liquor license at the premises had been approved by the Liquor Control Board, Mrs. Choquette, accompanied by architect, Peter Rasins, presented a model layout of the structure that would be located on a five-acre site at the intersection of the Kinsale Road and No. 7 Hwy. Reeve Sherman Scott said that the building had been approved in principle by the Planning Board but the Council had not received anything in writing that the project had been completely finalized. The zoning would have to be changed from rural agricultural to commercial.

Mrs. Choquette said that construction would begin immediately if approval could be received before the winter freeze-up. The motel will contain 22 suites.

"I hope to make a lot of money out of the dining room," said the applicant, "If I sell a little bit of liquor, it will be so much gravy."

Reeve Scott said that he personally did not like the location of the proposed structure. "It's down in a valley and could impose a danger as an entrance onto No. 7 Highway," he said.

Mr. Rasins, the architect said that approval of the exit and entrance would have to come from the Dept. of Highways.

Would Cost \$2 Million To Purchase Township Owned Hydro System

The purchase, by the Twp. of Pickering, of its own hydro system would cost an estimated 2 1/2 million dollars, Reeve Sherman Scott told a meeting of Council on Monday night. He said that there was little chance that a piece-meal purchase could be arranged to include only the more densely populated region of the municipality. The Reeve suggested that through private ownership, a decrease in rates would likely result. He said that the reduction would increase as the period of ownership was extended.

It was agreed that contact should be made by the Ontario Municipal Board to discover if they would favour the promotion of a debenture in excess of the \$2,000,000 figure over a period of fifteen or 20 years.

The Reeve said that he had understood that Mr. Plitz
