India wants peaceful co-existence and the government is carrying on a program of reconstruction, but their Chinese neighbours have created difficulty. In industrial areas there is less interest in religion but through the country there is a revival of non-Christian faiths which has sprung up with the revival of national feeling. The country needs wise and experienced personnel, and here the Christian Church has a great opportunity.

S.R. Patterson Urges Better Financing For Capital School Costs

S.R. Patterson, speaking at the Unionville Home & School Association recently produced convincing evidence that the failure to use administrative fees for Capital school expenditures is costing the ratepayers of Markham Township many thousands of dollars annually in excess of school rates. Mr. Patterson is a chartered accountant and chairman of the Public School Trustees Ass'n of Markham Township and has made a detailed study of school costs. He stated that many farmers were required to pay lot fees to the Municipality without receiving any benefit in return.

Mr. Patterson read letters from school trustees in Markham Township who are seriously considering the problem of school financing. Mr. Jack Stone, trustee of TSA No. 1 in the Thornhill area when interviewed said: "Are you paying more taxes now - and enjoying it less? You probably are if you are a taxpayer in Markham Township School area No. 1." Mr. Stone went on to say, "Just about every new subdivision that is occupied adds to the load of existing school facilities and generally results in a school addition, or in some cases, a complete new school. As a taxpayer in this area you are taxed for existing and new school facilities. "When you buy your home, you pay either directly or indirectly a lot fee amounting to at least \$500. As has been pointed out previously the Municipal Act states that this fee shall be used within the school area, which it is collected. Since roads, curbs, sewers and water services are paid by the subdivider, where is your lot fee spent? This is to advise you that it is not being spent to build that new school."

"Stated as simply as possible the use of lot fees to reduce the initial entrance cost of building schools will result directly in lower school taxes in your school area. Support your school board in their efforts to reduce school building costs

and taxes in your area."

Another letter Mr. Patterson read was from Mr. Don McClelland trustee of the TSA No. 2 school near Locust Hill and Cedar Grove who, in expressing his opinion on the subject had this to say: "Rural communities of a township such as Markham must be constantly alert. Observations of townships such as ours peripheral to a large city, indicate that a quiet hamlet can become a busy subdivision practically overnight. Certainly pupil population can exceed current accommodation faster than the established residents can afford to build more schools. A township should have a sense of responsibility to tax payers of long standing. A portion of lot fees collected from the potential inhabitants would be his contribution to the building of additional necessary classrooms or schools. This is not a radical practice. Other enterprising municipalities have used this method of defraying the cost of education."

Mr. Patterson said here are opinions from opposite sides of the Township and in between we have school area No. 2, where the taxpayers will lose over \$62,000 in the next twenty years and most of that in the next five years, because lot fees amounting to \$25,000 have been diverted for purposes other than capital school costs.

Reference was made to the proposed subdivision at Unionville. Mr. Patterson gave substantial evidence that ratepayers at Unionville and those who will become ratepayers will be mortgaged beyond endurance unless the lot fees are used for the erection of required school facilities. The use of lot fees could provide a school without debt and maintain a much lower tax rate for many years to come.

At the close of the meeting it was announced that Mr. Patterson urged by many citizens was considering a nomination as candidate for reeve of Markham Township at the coming election.
