Million Dollar Addition For Markham High School

Markham District High School Board members appearcd before Markham Township Council on Monday evening requesting tentative approval on an expenditure of \$490,000 for a 14-room addition to the Markham District High School. .

Total cost of the addition is estimated at \$1,506,000 with government grants reducing this figure to \$499,000. Of this amount the township share is 48.75%. The extensive addition will contain a number of rooms for technical teaching.

"Aren't you afraid of the expenditure?" councillor Hoover asked Board members. Spokesman Walter Heaton said the Board realized the figures were high but considered it was a "good deal" considering the amount of grant the government was paying. Councillor Rumble while he seconded the resolution giving tentative approval, said he did so with misgivings. Wm.
