Horticultural Society Achieves Much In '63

Williams) To conclude the season of 1962, the directors of the Stouffville Horticultural Society accompanied by their wives and husbands spent a very enjoyable evening as guest of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Barkey at their home. A buffet supper was served with moose as the main dish followed by an evening of crokinole. A business meeting set up plans for 1963 and membership was recorded at 209.

During the past year, the directors held twelve meetings at homes throughout the town. Community projects sponsored by the Society included a \$50 donation to the Stouffville Community Centre Board for the purchase of trees to be planted in the parkette at Westlawn Cresc. The grass plot at the C.N.R. station was cleaned up and levelled with two loads of fill.
