Advise Caution On Metro Take-Over Of Pickering Schools

Reeve Sherman Scott advised Pickering Twp. Council on Monday night that they should proceed with caution and make a careful study of the future effects of Metro influence on the municipality, especially in a field of education. The reeve was referring to the Goldenberg Commission established in June by Premier John Robarts to study the future of Metropolitan Toronto.

Councillor Hubert Wank noted however, that in School Area No. 2, school rates were a matter of concern.

"We can't consider mill rates alone," said Reeve Scott, "but also other services that would be provided." He agreed that a brief could be prepared only after much careful study.

Councillor Harvey Spang said that he would be opposed to a Metro take-over of all schools in the township.

Councillor Mowbray agreed that in many sections, the current school mill rate did not present a problem.

Paul Wellman, R.R.2 Claremont, Wins 100 Bushel Corn Club

Mr. Paul Wellman, RR 2, Claremont, was the winner of the Ontario County 100 Bushel Corn Club this year. He had a yield of 123.3 bushels of shell-corn with 15% moisture per acre.

In second place was Gordon Hunter, RR 1, Brooklin, with a yield of 122.2 bushels per acre. In third place was Malcolm Allbright, Balsam, with a yield of 117 bushels per acre.

Twenty-four farmers took part in the 100 Bushel Corn Club this year. Yields were taken on a three-acre plot. Each contestant could use any variety he wished, and use any means at his disposal to produce the highest possible yield. The average yield for the 24 contestants was 86.6% bushels per acre.

The Club was brought to a conclusion with a 100 Bushel Corn Club banquet in Hauger's Restaurant, Manchester, on Thursday, Nov. 14. Mr. Jack Morgan, Claremont, was the chairman of the banquet.

Mr. Lynn Fair, Agricultural Representative, announced the prize winners, and called on the various donors of cash and merchandise to present their prizes.

Mr. Walter Atkinson, Stouffville, presented a splendid set of coloured slides on their recent visits to California and British Columbia. Mr. Jack Leek expressed the thanks of those present to Mr. Atkinson, for his very fine illustrated address.

Mr. Leek also extended the appreciation of the corn growers to the donors of the various prizes for their co-operation in making the prizes available for the corn club each year.
