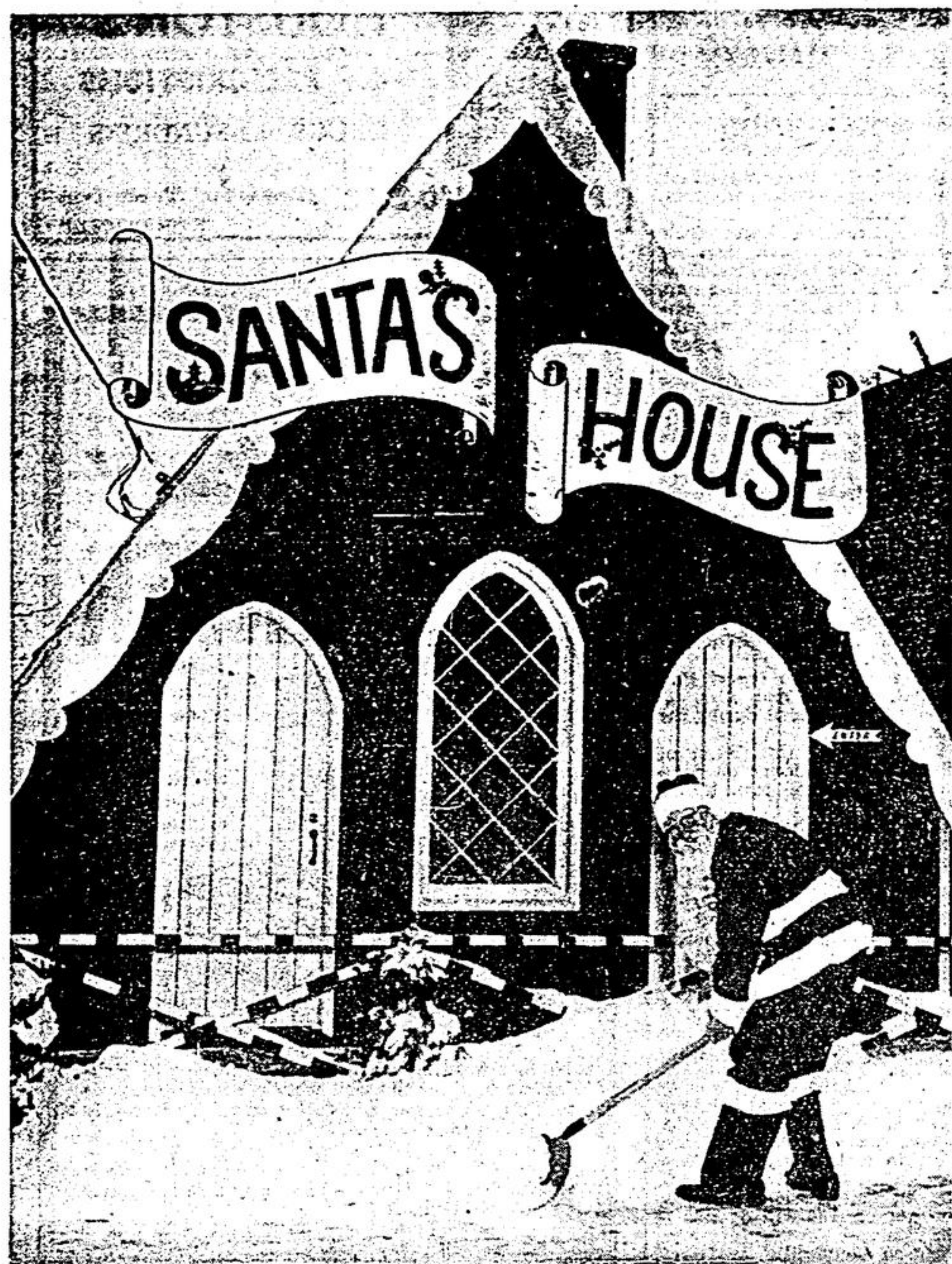


Even Santa Shovels Snow
