

Barry McLean Scores Six Points As Junior "Clippers" Thump Uxbridge 7-2 Before New Year's Day Crowd Of 400

Stouffville Clipper centre Barry McLean rapped in two goals in addition to assisting on four others to lead the local pucksters to a convincing 7-2 win over Uxbridge "Chicks" yesterday afternoon.

One of the largest crowds to watch a Junior game here in some time was on hand for the contest. The paid admission totalled over 400 people.

The game was the best the Stouffville club has played to date this season. Glenn Jackson, although not overworked, turned in a steady game in the "Clippers" cage. Coach George Stark praised the work of defencemen Stan Feasby and Wayne Keeler. Feasby had an assist on one of Barry McLean's goals.

McLean opened the scoring for the "Clippers" at the five and a half minute mark of the first period. Pete Reesor killed five minutes later to make the score 2-0. In the second frame Stouffville outscored the Uxbridge squad 3-2. The "Clippers" added two more counters in the final twenty minutes. The two goals scored in the last period came in a space of twenty-five seconds, the first at the 0:27 mark and the next at 0:53.

The Uxbridge squad was missing rightwinger Riley O'Connor for this game. It is likely that O'Connor, who earlier led the "Chicks" to two victories over Stouffville, will finish out the season with the Stouffville squad. Under OHA regulations he must play with the team nearest to where he lives.
