Dear Sir: The Markham and District Branch of the Red Cross Blood Donors Clinic, is again asking for your assistance, and without a doubt, everyone knows that blood is urgently needed. The next clinic will be held in the Veteran's Hall Markham on Monday, January 20 from 2:00 to 4:30 and 6:30 to 9:00. Can we count on you? Nothing you'll ever do, no time you'll ever spend can be more richly rewarding than a few minutes you'll spend in giving blood and whenever you or your family needs blood or blood products, you will receive it free of charge with no obligation for replacement. Anyone in average health between the ages of 18 and 65 who has not had jaundice, or been hospitalized recently may donate. Every phase of the program is under professional supervision and including the time of testing, registration, rest and refreshments it requires 30 minutes. The actual giving of the blood takes only 4 to 5 mins. We have names in our files of over 300 previous donors and although all of these are contacted, the number of those who attended the last Clinic in July and with the number of persons
