White snow lies deep across the garden. A thin fall continues to blow in from the southwest. Along by the fence under the feeding tray, a mass of little dark objects dart, skip and hop about in a seeming exercise in perpetual motion. They are cleaning up the seeds and grain which the Bird Lady scatters there mornings, noon and evenings. They at some mysterious signal, the 98 sparrows, all with one accord sweep up into the bare branches of the lilacs and soon scatter. Some juncos then appear, dainty in form and movements, and scratch around in the snow. Bright-eyed little chick-a-dees alight on the set hanging well out on a limb and swing as they peck and peck until a nutcracker chases them away. At the other side of the orchard a blue jay calls, and before long several of them flash like blue streaks in to the maple and thence down to the feed tray to sample the menu.

I remember hearing of an old gentleman in Paisley, Scotland who used to dip bread crumbs in whiskey and throw them to the birds on his lawn. Some became quarrelsome or combative, some amorous, some started to sing with little hiccupps. They tried to fly but couldn't take off and staggered about while the old rascal laughed and laughed till he fell off his chair and had to be revived with some of the "good mercuries" which fortunately had not all been wasted on the birds.

We have no such extras on our premises but there are other things. The Bird Lady was preparing stuffing for the turkey. She had the bread crumbs ready and picked up a bottle of Glenwood black pepper to apply a sprinkle but the cap was loose and half the contents spilled over the crumbs. With a cry of disgust and not too much thought she swept the lot into the tin she kept for her birds and at noon it went out to the trough and around. The look-out sparrow sent out his message. Soon came the flock-tentative-fifty-seventy-the whole ninety-eight. They hopped and pecked as fast as they could. Faster and faster. Then a few stopped and cocked their heads. Soon they all stopped. One gave a small sneeze. Another sneezed then many more-sneeze-sneezed. Suddenly with mass instinct the whole flock rose in the air and disappeared. We hoped that night that wherever they were in their various little nests, that their respiratory disturbances gradually subsided and that they were kept pepper warm all through the night, till the coming of a Merry Christmas morn.
