The water project slated for Don Mills Road, Buttonville area has many ifs about it but last week a new proposal was put forth at Markham Township Council. This suggestion is for a 12" main to run from John Street north to 1400' below No. 7 highway, approximately the corner of the Rodick farm. From there a 6" main would be laid north to Lot 14 in Buttonville. Estimated cost of this proposal would be 31 per foot frontage on individual homes, and \$3.25 per acre on open farm land.

Their mother, Patricia Tully, also makes an occasional appearance.

As well as CBC and Britain's ATV, other stations in Britain, France, Germany and Australia have purchased the show, and the CBC has signed up for a new series next year. Plans are also underway to run the Forest Ranger this year on the CBC French network with dubbed voices. Watch for the show on Channel 6 every Saturday at 5:00 p.m.

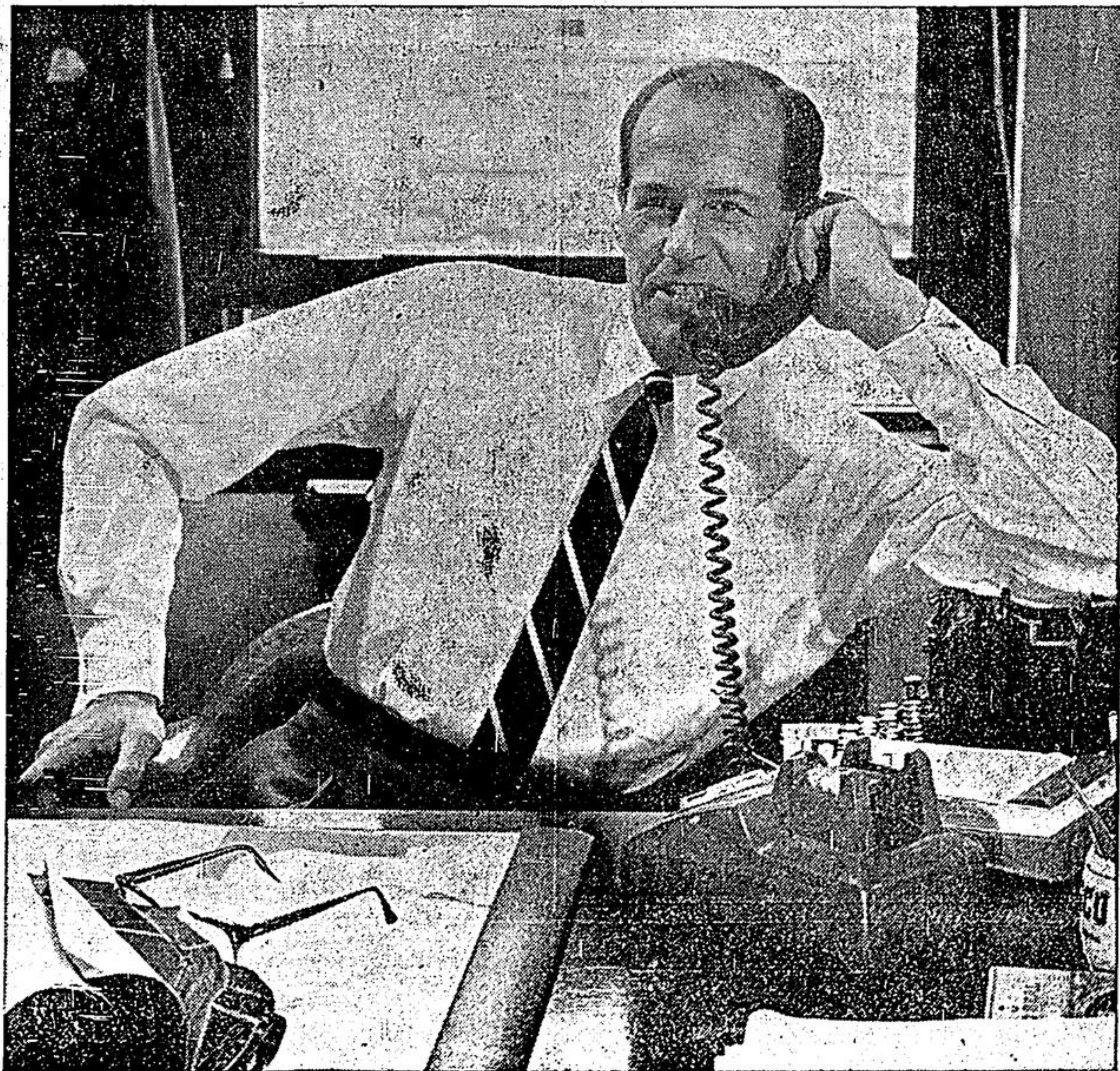
