Church Annual Meeting Shows \$21,000 Givings

The congregation of Stouffville United Church in annual meeting on Wednesday night heard reports of the work during 1963 and a treasurer's report showing total contributions of \$21,177.09. Of this amount, \$4,350.28 was for missionary and maintenance work. Envelope givings amounted to approximately \$11,000 and there was a thank offering of \$4,390.

Membership in the church stands at 451. There were 32 baptisms conducted during the year and twelve marriages. The increase in membership in the year was ten.

The trustee board acknowl edged a gift during the year from the F. E. Rae estate of \$26,704 which brought the total assets of the church reserve fund to \$47,220.57.

meeting of Stouffville United TO CLOSE PEACH'S Church voted last week to purchase land west of the High School on Edward St. with a view to erecting a new church within the next few years.

Mr. Walt Todd is chairman of a committee which has been investigating the possiblity of obtaining land for some time. Present zoning regulations require churches to have considerably more parking accommodation than is available on the present church property while the building itself is not believed adequate for today's needs, particularly in the Sunday affiliate with the United Church School department.
