Move Closer To Having County BETZ - Bernard and Alice wish to announce the birth of a son, Jan. 12, 1964 at the K. Planning Help

York County Council is slowly moving towards providing some type of county planning assistance, having in mind those municipalities in the northern part of the county which have no planning boards. However, it was revealed at a special meeting of council this week that the cost will be considerable. Murray Jones & Associates have already presented one report which will cost the munic-

ipalities \$5,000. Mr. Jones told the members that he estimated the cost of Prayer Books providing proper planning consultant help would be \$30,000 a year. Reeve Frank Williams of Whitchurch asked if this figure might not snowball shortly to \$100,000. Mr. Jones replied that his figures were accurate and a county planner with the proper staff should not cost over the \$30,000. For this money they would be able to assist any municipality with an Official Plan and Zoning.

The planning boards presently in operation in the county would continue as before, Mr. Jones said.


